**CANADIAN RED CLOVER**

The increasing demand in the United Kingdom for Canadian red clover seed is a tribute to Canadian agriculture. Red clover is not a native of North America and was introduced to this continent only as long ago as the end of the eighteenth century. Its suitability to a northern climate like that of Canada depended a great deal on the ability of the Canadian farmer to originate a hardy variety. Chilean red clover, for instance, and other varieties from countries with a mild climate, are killed by the Canadian winter, except in the southern parts of the Dominion. The hardy Canadian red clover is now in demand in other countries. Red clover was brought into culture comparatively late. In Italy and Spain its cultivation was established during the 15th and 16th centuries. It was introduced into Holland from Spain in the 16th century and made its way to England in the first half of the 17th century, the English name being derived from the Dutch "Klaver." No forage plant has been so important to agriculture. This is due says the Dominion Botanist, not only to its high feeding value, which is surpassed by few plants, but also to its service as a fertilizer
