

Egg And Poultry Market Report

Greater activity has taken place in the poultry market during the past week reports Mr. F. M. Nash, senior poultry products inspector.

The egg market being remunerative and supplies getting short in the Maritimes, greater profits would be secured from poultry operations if producers would delay the selling of layers until after production has ceased or decreased to levels when production is unprofitable.

Egg production is decreasing and operators of registered stations report receipts down 6 per cent from last week. Quality is good. Producers should remember the demand and the increased prices are for Grade A eggs and make the necessary steps to market this product.

There has been no change in prices quoted for ungraded eggs but some grading station operators have been able to dispose of their product at increased prices.

Electric Rates Hearing Adjourned

No judgment was rendered yesterday by the Public Utilities Commission on the application of the Maritime Electric Company for an increase in electricity rates for summer cottages, tourist cabins, and other part-time services in rural areas served by the Company.

The chairman agreed with Mr. Martin that the Maritime Electric Company should submit comparative figures before showing the rates now in effect on existing lines to summer cottages and cabins as well as those rates which the Company asks for the running of new lines.

P. E. I. Continued from page 1. Mr. J.G. Dennis was re-elected as secretary. Two of the three retiring members of last year's Board of Directors were re-elected together with Mr. Brendon Curran, Vernon River, who was newly-elected to the Board.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT — In his President's report, Mr. Jerome O'Brien informed delegates that "last December the Provincial Government in conjunction with the Dominion Government established a policy of making loans to co-operative associations for the purpose of constructing truckside potato warehouses. Four co-operatives, namely: Tignish, Bloomfield, Vernon River and Morell have secured permits and are building warehouses." Mr. O'Brien continued his report by referring to the change in legal counsel during the past year from Mr. A.W. Matheson to Mr. A.H. Peake. Mr. Matheson asked to be relieved of his duties because of the great volume of work entailed in his post as Minister of Agriculture and was expressed for the generous aid which Mr. Matheson had rendered to co-operatives. His successor, Mr. Peake, had made a special study of cooperative tax problems and legal procedure. Referring to the national body Mr. O'Brien stated, "we continue to have the most satisfactory relations with the Cooperative Union of Canada." And in interprovincial relations "we have enjoyed very cordial relations with the Co-operative Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The close cooperation between these three organizations resulted in a planning Conference being held in Moncton, June 19th. Four delegates attended from your Union. Many problems facing the Maritime Co-operative Movement were discussed and probable solutions were advanced.

"During the year we have had the greatest cooperation and help from the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University headed by Rev. M.E. Francis. He also drew attention to the attention to the staff of an accountant, Mr. Frank Gallant.

In concluding his remarks, the President thanked, on behalf of all the cooperatives, Mr. J.G. Dennis and his staff for the efficient discharge of their duties during the year. A proposal was made which authorized the Board of Directors to work out a number of essay contests for the schools, similar to the ones adopted by the P.E.I. Credit Union League.

In his annual report as secretary, Mr. J.G. Dennis presented a comprehensive review of the position of cooperatives throughout the Province and described some of the problems which the Association is now facing. In referring to business trends, "the Co-operatives are now passing into a new business cycle," he said, which is not fool-proof as were the prosperous years of the war when money was plentiful and goods scarce. Merchandise is now in greater supply and variety, while money has tightened up to some extent.

Discussing the problem of taxation, Mr. Dennis said, "We have been successful this year, through the efforts of the Co-operative Union of Canada, with some help from your Co-operative Union, and your local organizations in getting some measure of relief from the Dominion Government through amendments to the Act."

In an extensive examination of the current picture of the fishing industry, the Secretary first mentioned the seasonal nature and the uncertainty of the business and concluded by stating: "During the past year the fishermen of this Province have been very hard hit by the scarcity of fish, the high operating costs, and the uncertainty of markets for some classes of canned fish. It is essential to the future of the fish industry and to the welfare of our fishermen that the Fishermen's Co-operatives build up large cash reserves which will enable them to purchase supplies and sell their fish co-operatively. This can be done only by first reducing the operating costs in the canning and processing of fish and by obtaining satisfactory and assured markets for their products."

"These things can be done with proper co-operation among all the fishermen. Government demonstration assistance similar to that provided by agricultural departments through their Experimental Stations would be a great factor in bringing this about. Our method in catching and handling fish in this province is not at all as modern and efficient as it could be, and no one seems to be much concerned. I believe, that if the fishermen working co-operatively would investigate the methods of catching and processing fish as used in other provinces and states and agree on something satisfactory to the fishermen of this province, excellent results would be achieved, and governments, no doubt, would give the assistance required."
