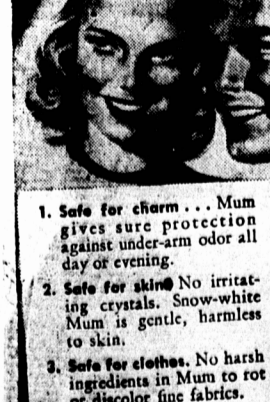

Confederation Life Annual Meeting

At the 77th annual meeting of Confederation Life Association today, J. K. Macdonald, president, and C. D. Devlin, vice-president and general manager, reported that 1948 had been an outstanding year. New business written in 1948 was \$121,083,807, a gain of \$1,821,235 over 1947. Insurance in force reached an all-time high of \$93,544,406, the \$105,395,136 gain being more than \$17 millions greater than any previous year. Assets and policy reserves increased to \$231,354,550 and \$182,944,984 respectively. Payments to policyholders and beneficiaries were \$615,000 greater than in any previous year.

Mr. Macdonald reported that interest earned on invested assets decreased from 3.68% in 1947 to 3.51% in 1948. This was attributed to the maturing and refunding of many older investments purchased originally at excellent rates, and the fact that during the war years all funds available were placed in war loans at 3% or less. On the other hand, mortgage investments were placed at an average rate of interest of 4.93%, compared with 4.89% in 1947. The average rate earned upon all new investments, including policy loans, was 4.10%.
