# Pro-Boer Plots.

OTTAWA, April 23.—A newspaper correspondent reports, in connection with the Welland canal explosion, that there is abundant evidence in the possession of the government pointing to the existence of a movement in the United States to inflict injury upon Canada on account of her participation in the South African war. A great military authority some months ago gave your correspondent a hint that there would be trouble this spring, and personally he objected to so many twelve pounder guns being sent out of the country to the Cape. The attempt at injury has been made, but hardly at the spot where it was looked for, great vigilance has been exhibited at different points by the authorities, both police and military, but with a boundary line of 4,000 miles to watch it was not easy to foresee where the enemy would strike. Two months ago there was trouble at Esquimalt, B. C. Suspicious characters were seen around the fortifications, and the Royal Artillery guards were consequently doubled. This duty became so fatiguing to the small body of regulars there that assistance had to be given them, and this accounts for the presence in the Esquimalt fortifications to-day of 160 men who were originally enlisted for the Halifax garrison regiment.

Here in Ottawa the police authorities have also been on the alert. A special night guard has for six months been detailed to watch the big vault of the Finance Department, where millions of treasure are kept. Within the past week or two supernumerary Dominion police in plain clothes have mightily patrolled the parliament grounds.

Careful investigation leads to the belief that the headquarters of this aggressive Boer movement were in Chicago, and it is said that confidential information showing the existence of a conspiracy was some time ago communicated to the United States Government.

Should this be the case, the Thorold outrage may assume an important international character, as the United States Government would, under the comity of nations, be held responsible for permitting certain parties within its territory to work out the details of a plot against a friendly state.
