Preparing For Round-The-World Flight

(Special to the Guardian)

LAKEHURST, N.J., Aug. 6.—Earth-bound for a few hours the mighty German air liner Graf Zeppelin rested in the naval hangar here today while workmen prepared her for her round-the-world flight which begins Wednesday. Patching and painting, dozens of puny humans crawled over the big silver covering of the Graf, repairing the damage caused as she buffeted the winds in her 95 hour voyage from Germany. Meanwhile other crews were pumping fuel and hydrogen into her tanks.

The greatest of caution was taken as the workmen caulked about their tasks. No one was allowed to ascend to the upper floor of the hangar unless they wore rubber soled shoes as a precaution against a spark being struck off near the gas filled bag of the Zeppelin. Hand pumps were used for the fuel lines, there being danger of sparks from electric-driven pumps.

Seven hundred and ninety thousand cubic feet of ethane gas will be pumped into the Graf's tanks to replace the fuel gas used on the westward trip. The ship will need 530,000 cubic feet of hydrogen to replace the lost lifting gas. In addition, five tons of gasoline will be placed aboard. By working all night the task is expected to be completed by 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Dr. Hugo Eckener supervised part of the work. The Zeppelin's motors, he announced, were in perfect condition. Only a few tiny holes were torn in the envelope by the ocean winds, and they were easily repaired and painted. Dr. Eckener hopes to point the nose of his craft eastward some time Wednesday on its fourth crossing of the Atlantic Ocean. Only three stops will be made in the Graf Zeppelin's round-the-world flight. From Lakehurst the airship will head for Friedrichshafen, its home hangar. The second stop will be at Tokyo, and from there the Zeppelin will follow the great circle route over the Pacific to Los Angeles. Then Dr. Eckener will direct his ship for Lakehurst to complete the globe circling voyage which he expects will take 22 days.

U. S. WANT SCHNEIDER SEAPLANE TROPHY
WASHINGTON, D. C., August 6 (By Allen Quinn, Associated Press Aviation Editor)—Hopes of the United States to wrest the Schneider seaplane racing trophy from Great Britain are pinned on a small powerful monoplane which has been completed at the Philadelphia naval aircraft factory and is being tested by Lieutenant Al Williams of the Navy.

Details of the planes construction are being guarded. These are known, however, to depart from previous American racing plane practice, in that the craft is of monoplane rather than biplane design. It is powered with the Packard 24-cylinder "X" engine, which is understood to have undergone radical changes at the hands of experts at the naval factory. The engine develops more than 1,000 horsepower.

IN MEMORIAM

MR NORMAN MCKENZIE
(Needham Mass Exchange)
Norman MacKenzie, a native of this city and a resident of Needham Massachusetts for 38 years died on Tuesday, July 16th. He held a unique place in the life of that community and during the part of his stay there capably performed the duties of the Chief of Police. The eminent position which he occupied and the respect of his fellow townsmen for him are revealed by the large number which attended his funeral and by the presence of over fifty police officers from the neighbouring towns.
Norman MacKenzie was born in Prince Edward Island, May 3, 1858, the son of Malcolm and Katherine (McNevin) MacKenzie, Canoe Cove. For the past 38 years he has lived in Needham, where, before his appointment as police officer, he was employed by the late Alfred Parker, building contractor, December 28, 1881 he married Florie McNevin at Bonshaw, P. E. I., and to her he showed the truest devotion and the most tender care until her death, June 11, 1928. He is survived by four children—Harold L. of Stoneham, S. Mabel of Needham, Mrs. Seth Winch of Framingham and Mrs. Edward Blake of Needham; three brothers, Malcolm of Canoe Cove, Neil Long Creek and John, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island; three sisters, Mrs. Mary McLean of South Boston, Mrs. Florence McEachern of Brockton, and Mrs. Roderick McLean of Milo, Lot 9, Prince Edward Island, and three grand-children, Francis and Norman Winch and Harold MacKenzie Jr.
