**EGG LAYING COMPETITION**

Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest, for the week ending May 28, 1928.

Mr. Everett Howatt's W. L. again led the contest for the week with 62.8 points; the K. B. C. Hatchery B. R. were second with 61.7 points. The Exp. Station, W. L. pen 4, were third with 61.3 points; and the Experimental Station B. R. were fourth with 60.6 points.

Mr. Talmage Foster's B. R. hen No. 10 continues to lead the Contest to date with 171.7 points; the K. B. C. Hatchery B. R. hen No. 3 second with 169.5 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. hen No. 1 is third with 163.5 points; and Mr. E. R. Pendleton's B. R. hen No. 2 is fourth with 157.0 points.

The pens leading in total production to date are as follows:  
First, Exp. Station, W. L. pen No. 4—1207.8 points.  
Second, the Model Poultry Yards, B. R. pen No. 7—1203.6 points.  
Third, Exp. Station, W. L. pen No. 3—1184.2 points.  
Fourth, Mr. Everett Howatt's W. L.—1181.2 points.  
Fifth, Mr. Talmage Foster's B. R.—1165.3 points.

The total production for the week was 991 eggs and to date 19983 eggs.

Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the week ending June 4, 1928.

Mr. Harold Laird's B. R. led the contest for the week with 59.5 points; Mr. Everett Howatt's W. L. were second with 55.6 points; the K. B. C. Hatchery B. R. were third with 55.1 points; and the Exp. Station, W. L. pen 4, were fourth with 53.9 points.

Mr. Talmage Foster's B. R. hen No. 10 continues to lead the contest for individual production to date with 177.2 points; the K. B. C. Hatchery B. R. hen No. 3 is second with 176.5 points; Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. hens numbers 1 and 9 are third and fourth with 169.5 and 161.1 points respectively; and Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B. R. hen No. 2 is fifth with 161.0 points.

**Danish Immigrants**  
**Come to P. E. I.**

The Department of Agriculture in co-operation with Captain C. C. Hoeschen has placed almost one hundred immigrant farm laborers in the province since April 1st. of this season, the majority of which were experienced laborers from Denmark. On careful enquiry the report from their employers has invariably been that they are giving excellent satisfaction. Many of these men came to Canada seeking permanent residences and if conditions prove satisfactory they will eventually take up land becoming active and valuable producers, a class which we are desirous of encouraging, and we would ask the co-operation of their present employers and others who may be in a position to assist in endeavouring to pay them a proper and reasonable wage for their services, as we must remember that our farmers will eventually have to compete with Western Canada and other provinces of the Dominion where farm laborers receive better wages and are more generally given all year round employment. We wish to impress upon our farmers the necessity of endeavouring to provide for yearly employment. No good man is satisfied to work for six or eight months of the year and every farmer in this province who needs a man in summer may, by properly adjusting his farm management, furnish profitable work for his employee during the winter months. In fact unless this is done it would be impossible for us to retain these men in the province.

It is our opinion, after many years farming experience, that our agricultural province is greatly under-manned. We have already helped in the question of hired help in the light that we should be able to make a profit in the labor employed by growing our crops in summer and manufacturing them into more finished and valuable products in the winter. By intelligently following this practice a second profit over the one secured in growing the crop may be obtained.

More satisfactory service can be obtained by building a cottage and securing the service of a married man, but where this is not available provision must be made for boarding them in the family. The steady and faithful working Danes that are at present employed in this province should be paid equal wages to that given native help when they are able to perform equal work, and if advantage is taken of their position to pay anything less dissatisfaction is sure to occur which may influence these men to become emigrants and again migrate. While our Department is making every effort to select a suitable class of farm help we cannot be expected to furnish the same farmers with new hands another year if they do not make an effort to give their present men employment during the winter.

We feel that with the number of efficient machines now used on the average farm the employment of more men would greatly increase the production of our province. The prospects for Live Stock raising were never brighter. This coupled with a reasonable acreage of our good cash potato crop will furnish profitable employment in winter as well as in summer for very many more laborers than we are yet employing. **P. E. I. Trout For Massachusetts**

WAREHAM, Mass., June 11.—H. L. Handy, proprietor of one of the largest trout hatcheries in the world, has found that introduction of trout from Prince Edward Island has greatly improved his stock. Much of this improvement, according to Handy, is to be seen in the delicate pink tinge coloring the underpart of the fish now in his hatchery and the water he has stocked.

Handy annually raises hundreds of thousands of trout and at the present time there are over 200,000 trout ranging in size from five to ten inches in his hatchery. Also he has countless thousands of smaller fry. He has placed ten tons of trout averaging nine inches in length in the streams and ponds on his property this year.

Feeding the horde of ravenous fish is no small problem. Handy says the larger fish consume four tons of meat and fish weekly. The smaller fish, those newly hatched and up to fingerling size, are fed liver, ground to almost liquid consistency. This is introduced into the clear, cold water, absolutely necessary to trout.

Like any other business, Handy's has its risks. Natural enemies of trout must be combated throughout the year. These include mink and other various species of wading birds, such as the blue heron. During the winter months the mink and other are trapped and many of them are caught.

A by-product of the hatchery is trout eggs, and these are sent to many widely scattered sections of the country. An average sized trout will yield a thousand eggs, according to Handy. Handy is of the opinion that trout fishing of the future in this country will depend to a large extent on the stocking of streams.

**To Cultivate Blueberries**

PLYMOUTH, Mass., June 12.—Cape Cod cranberry growers have adopted a plan, which if successful, may multiply their profits. They are planting blueberries on the waste land surrounding their cranberry bogs, and it is claimed blueberry bushes given special attention reward the husbandman with berries of much larger size and finer quality. As the blueberry and cranberry seasons do not conflict there will be no labor problem.
