

# YESTERDAY'S STOCK AND BOND QUOTATIONS

## MARKET GOSSIP

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**NEW YORK, N. Y., March 23.**—The combined stock and bond markets today showed a general decline in prices, with the stock market showing a sharp drop in the afternoon. The bond market was more stable, with a slight rise in prices.

The stock market opened with a heavy loss, and the decline continued throughout the day. The Dow Jones Industrial Average closed at 111.14, down 1.14 points from the previous day's close. The S&P 500 index also fell, ending at 107.14, down 1.14 points.

The bond market was more active, with a general rise in prices. The 2 1/2% U.S. Treasury bonds were up 1/8 cent to 101 1/8. The 3% U.S. Treasury bonds were up 1/8 cent to 102 1/8.

The foreign exchange market was also active, with the Canadian dollar showing a slight rise. The Canadian dollar was up 1/8 cent to 67 1/8.

## Montreal Market Sidelights

**MONTREAL, Que., March 23.** (By the Canadian Press)—Slightly lower price tendencies developed today on the Montreal stock exchange. The leading issues were mixed with Canadian Pacific and International Nickel fractionally higher. Brazilian Tractor and Canadian Car and National Steel Car off fractions.

Losses were in the majority by 7 to 10 in the closing. The public found nothing in business news or in Wall Street's action to encourage trading and the session dragged with very little fluctuation in values. Canadian Pacific Railway was again most active, with sales of 2,901 and closed at its best level of the day, 48 for an advance of 1/4. Nickel's 1/4 rise to 9 was scored on sales of 1,400 shares while Brazilian, with sales of 1,117 shares, moved closely around 12 1/2, where it closed unchanged.

A small lot of Canadian Hydro-Electric Preferred appeared at 50 and 48, closing at the former figure for a net decline of 10 points from its last appearance. The stock was bought and sold the widest advance with a gain of 1 1/2 points to 61 1/2.

Stocks closed at 111.14, down 1.14 from B. T. Power, off 1/4 at 2 1/2. Canadian Car, off 1/4 at 6. General Steel Works off 1/4 at 1 1/2. Hollinger, down to 2 1/2. National Steel Car, off 1/4 at 9 1/2. National Steel Car, off 1/4 at 11 1/2. ex-dividend. St. Lawrence Preferred, down to 10 1/2. Steel of Canada, off 1/4 at 2 1/2.

Sales were at a brisker pace than yesterday, due to a larger turnover of 6,005 and 2,333 on the corresponding day of last year. There were bond sales recorded.

Sterling closed at \$4.0796 and United States money at 12 per cent premium.

The exchange announced that the minimum price would be removed effective Thursday, March 31.

**MONTREAL, Que., March 23.**—Prices drifted irregularly within narrow limits in today's slightly more active market on the local stock exchange, with nothing in the day's news or in the action of the market in Wall Street, where an uncertain trend prevailed, to encourage an increased participation in the stock market here.

C. P. R. improved fractionally in increased volume here, while of the other interlisted issues, Brazilian finished unchanged, while International Nickel improved 1/4. Canada Cement Preferred was a firm feature here, with a gain of 1 1/2 points, while among the issues to record fractional gains were McColl Frontenac and Steel of Canada.

The close here found losses slightly in excess of gains, while the average price of twenty stocks declined 63 to a new low for the index of 23.76. An announcement was made by the Montreal stock exchange today that effective a week from tomorrow, Thursday, March 31, the minimum price would be removed from Quebec Power. Today's session on the Montreal Stock Exchange and the Curb Market here marks the last until next Tuesday, with the protracted holiday in observance of the Easter week end. Most of the under financial and commodity markets of the world are remaining closed on Good Friday, but many of them will re-open for Saturday's brief session.

## DR. JAMES WALSH, MT. STEWART

The death occurred very suddenly on Feb. 26th of Dr. James Walsh of Mt. Stewart in his 77th year, ending a life of faithful service in his community. Dr. Walsh was born in Charlottetown, being the only son of Mr. James Walsh. He received his early education at public school, and was graduated from St. Dunstan's College, afterwards entering the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania, where he graduated in 1876 at the early age of 22 years. Being a brilliant student he later took several post graduate courses in New York, Chicago and Mayo Clinic, which added greatly to his success in his medical profession.

In 1877 he returned to P. E. I., where he entered upon his practice at Mount Stewart, did his work well and died leaving a wide circle of friends to cherish the memory of a good man who shared with them the joys and sorrows of their lives and worked successfully for the welfare of his community.

He leaves a sorrowing wife, formerly Minnie Egan and nine children, James, Minneapolis, Regina, Ivan and Clarence in New York, Evelyn and Allen in Boston, Frances in Saskatchewan, Mary, R. N., and Helen at home; two grandchildren, James and Joseph Walsh, New York city. His only sister Mary, (Mrs. Dennis Murphy) predeceased him several years ago.

His funeral which took place on the 29th was very largely attended, friends coming from all parts of the country. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by his Pastor, Rev. A. P. McLeann, Rev. J. B. McKenry, deacon, Rev. D. P. Crockett.

## DO NOT OVERPRUNE

In years past the necessity of pruning has often been exaggerated but some of course is necessary. At least no tree should be burdened by diseased or dead wood, and no tree should be allowed to retain interfering branches. In the old orchard that has been neglected, taking out this dead and diseased wood and the removal of the interfering branches will be enough for one year's job. In some cases it may be too much, for in those cases where neglect has been the rule there may be too many interfering branches. Have you not seen trees into which the pruning saw has gone for the first time in years, shoot up innumerable water sprouts? They come from all the branches and even the trunks of the trees. That is absolutely sure to happen if a tree is overpruned. The happy medium in pruning is reached where the dead and diseased wood is taken out and then any surplus wood to the point where there will be uniform twig growth over the tree and no extra-strong water sprouts.

It is better to take two, three or even four years for this job of cleaning up the old orchard, and instead of spending all the time and enthusiasm on the pruning job, spend a little on the highly important job of getting the spraying under way when the time for first spraying arrives.

## MIGRATING B. C. CRABS COVER MILE A WEEK

Studying the migratory movements of Pacific coast crabs last year in the course of investigations designed to assist the fishery, a scientist, working under the Dominion Government, discovered that some of the crustaceans travelled about at the rate of three miles in as many weeks. Standards of speed differ perhaps in different branches of the animal kingdom. All told, some 800 crabs were tagged in the effort of the investigator to gather data as to the course of crab wanderings in British Columbia waters. Further examination of results is necessary, however, before any conclusive findings can be recorded.

## PRODUCE
