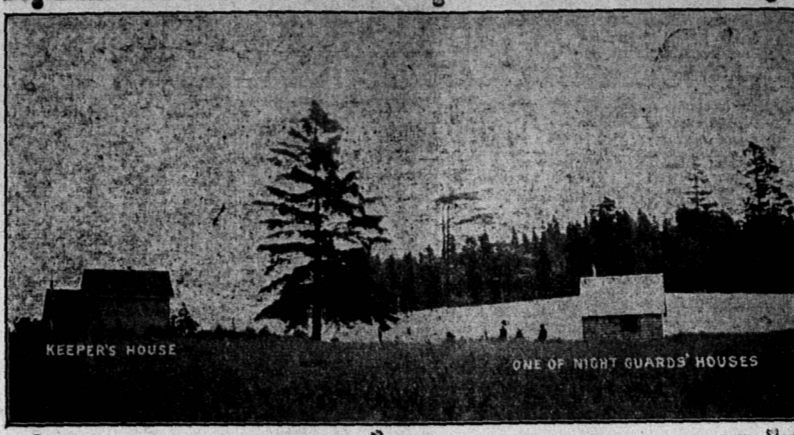


JOHN R. DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES LTD.

Description of Ranch

The chief point of interest for the thousands of tourists who visit Charlottetown is the Dinnis farm. It is situated about ten minutes' drive from the city on an emmené overlooking the harbor and consists of one hundred and sixty acres of land. It is chiefly of interest because the fox ranch which occupies ten acres of woodland on the highest point of this farm is the largest in the Province and its owner has the reputation of being the most successful of fox breeders up to the present time.

Situated as it is on a wooded hilltop it is ideally located for a fox home. The Natural drainage of the ground is perfect, so that there is no danger of spring freshets so fatal to young foxes. The air is always pure and fresh, for the winds which sweep the hilltop carry away all harmful and disagreeable odors and tumbled the chilling fogs into the valley below. The fact that Mr. Dinnis has never had a single case of sickness among his animals since he acquired the present ranch (three years ago) is sufficient evidence of the healthfulness of the ranch and surroundings. The ranch has an enviable history of success. Last year seven per cent. of the Island's increase of young foxes were born in this ranch. This year Mr. Dinnis has raised fifty-eight young foxes. It is not much wonder that he is called the "Wizard Rancher."

Description of Foxes

DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES are regarded as the type, "par excellence" of silver black fox. They are characterized by thin mobile ears; a full neck, short and arched from the back; width over shoulders and through the heart; a long, delicately turred head; a springy pelt, and pink skin covered with a wealth of fine lustrous fur, particularly marked on limbs and under body; and a large heavy "brush". These are the Hall marks of health and vigour.

AN EXPERT'S OPINION

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Hylaire Belloc, a graduate of Oxford and now University Professor, who served five years as officer in the French artillery and probably the most famous military critic says: "An attempt of Germans to turn the allies' line round Cambrai, whether that operation can be successfully carried out or not, will depend almost entirely upon an unknown factor, the numbers the French have gathered within striking distance south and east of Leclauz."

Of German barbarities in Belgium, Belloc points out that German troops have direct orders from their superiors and a clear object before them that any means are to be adopted of spreading terror whenever there is so much as a suspicion of resistance upon the part of the civil population and on this account we must be prepared for not only summary shooting of elderly men and youths who have been caught with arms in their hands, but also of any who have been suspected. These methods, with the destruction of property on all sides, and the burning of houses, will be pursued in France as well as Belgium, and should a force land in England we must be prepared for it.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—What might have been a more serious accident, occurred at French Fort, Wednesday evening, when Mr. George Boswell, of that place, was engaged in tarring the roof of his large barn. The hooks of the roof ladder gave way and it came to the ground with terrific force, bringing Mr. Boswell with it, a distance of fifteen or twenty feet. It seems all his weight came on one foot which resulted in a very badly sprained ankle, which will doubtless lay Mr. Boswell up for a considerable length of time.

FROM CAMP AT SYDNEY.—Judging by private letters received from the soldierboys at Canso and Sydney they are enjoying the rollicking life of the barracks and almost continuous drill and fairly hard work. One of the youngest in the group at Sydney, writing home, after talking about little toothache, a slight cold and some other minor ills, gave indirect evidence that his health was unimpaired by asking that a chicken be sent him by parcel post. (The Guardian understands that the request was complied with by return mail). A few mornings ago the alarm signal woke up the camp at 4.30 and all hands were ready for action in ten minutes. The cause of the alarm was probably a drill exercise, and the excuse that a cruiser was coming up the harbor and she might be a German. It was foggy in the harbor and the cruiser was quite close when, to the mingled disappointment and relief of the young soldiers she was discovered to be British. "Most of the fellows," said the writer, "were disappointed as they were anxious to show what No-Battery was made of."
