The indictments named General Motors Corporation, Ford Motor Company and Chrysler Corporation, and affiliated finance companies and individuals.

In Memoriam

MRS. HELEN A. MITCHELL

The death of Mrs. Helen Adelaide Mitchell which occurred at Charlottetown on Wednesday, May 25th, 1898, is much regretted, by friends here, and elsewhere.

Mrs. Mitchell was the wife of the late William F. Mitchell for some years Manager of the Royal Bank of Canada in Charlottetown and afterwards in Halifax.

A daughter of the late William H. Pope, one of the Fathers of Confederation, and Helen DesBrisay, his wife, Mrs. Mitchell was born at "Ardgowan" in suburbs of Charlottetown on March 10th, 1859, and was therefore in her 39th year.

Mrs. Mitchell was a member of the Church of England and when in Charlottetown was a faithful communicant at St. Peter's Cathedral. She was predeceased by her husband and two children Gordon and Helen (Bonnie), wife of John W. Regan, Esq., of Halifax. Mrs. Mitchell was the wife of the late William F. Mitchell for some years Manager of the Royal Bank of Canada in Charlottetown and afterwards in Halifax.

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
