THE COOK'S CORNER

ORANGE CAKE

1/2 cup butter, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup raisins, 1/2 cup orange, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar.

DATE CAKE

2 cups dates, 1 cup boiling water, set aside to cool, 1 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup flour, 1 egg, add to date mixture, then add 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup walnut meats if desired.

CARROT CAKE

1-1 1/2 cups brown sugar, 1 cup raisins, 1-1 1/2 cups cold water, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup grated carrots, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon nutmeg.

MOLASSES CAKE

1/2 cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup molasses, 1 cup buttermilk, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon salt.
