SOLVING THE HIGH COST.—The Dominion Coal company is doing its bit—in an effort to solve the high cost of living for its workmen. The steamer Nevada, chartered by the company and laden with produce from P. E. I., will call at the different colliery ports of the company and distribute cargo. Potatoes, according to quality, are selling at from 75 to 80 cents per bushel from the steamer, and other produce at a similar low rate, says a Sydney paper.

FOX BUSINESS NOT SO BAD.—An Islander who is interested in the black fox business tells us that his company sold 1,000 of black foxes the other day for \$1,000, says the Pictou Advocate. Five years ago their price would have been \$10,000. The fox business, however, is not doing too bad. Companies are reducing their capitalization per pair by increasing their stock and are just selling enough to pay expenses. Our informant said that his company could have got as much for the pelt as for the foxes alive, perhaps more, but they would have had to wait longer for their money.

WHAT TO EXPECT.—Of the period covering from Nov. 17th to 22nd the late Rev. I. L. Hicks, the noted St. Louis, Mo., weather prognosticator, whose death occurred last month, said: "Of a tendency to early cold, and storms of a wintry, boreal nature have preceded, except a renewed and increased dash of snow, sleet and early winter on and near the 17th, 18th and 19th. The passage of the moon over the celestial equator on the 19th may retard the change to colder; but the change will gather intensity by the delay, sending an unseasonably cold wave over most parts of the country beginning in the Northwest from about the 19th to the 22nd."

#### DISAPPEARANCE OF STEAMER FLORIZEL.

ST. John's, Nfld., Nov. 18.—The disappearance of the steamer Florizel furnished a puzzle for mariners last night. The Florizel, well known along the Atlantic coast as a freight and passenger carrier put into Belle Island in Conception Bay to take on a load of iron ore. In approaching a dock she was somewhat damaged from striking the pier and later backed into the harbor for an anchorage. During the night the steamer disappeared and was still unreported late last night. Along the water front much anxiety was felt regarding her as she had a crew of 35 men. It was thought possibly that in her damaged condition she had been carried seaward with an offshore wind, while there was not lacking some shipping men who believed she had foundered. The Florizel was owned by Bowring and Company and had been in the service of the Red Cross Line plying between New York and this port. Her net tonnage was 1900. Her sister ship the Stephan of the Red Cross Line was one of the five vessels sunk by the German submarine U-53 south of Nantucket lightship.
