REPORT OF THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH.

Margate, Oct 21st.

Officers and Worthy Representatives.

It affords me great pleasure to meet you today at this our sixty-second annual session, and also to welcome you to this prosperous and progressive community of Margate. It also affords us great pleasure to meet with the good brethren of old Prince William Division No 46 a division which has been running without a break for the last 48 years. This fact alone, certainly, speaks volumes for the strong and healthy temperance sentiment in this section of our jurisdiction.

We are met to review the work of the past year, and to take counsel together regarding the ways and means best calculated to advance the interests of temperance and truth, and hasten the complete destruction of the accursed liquor traffic throughout our fair lands. To-day may the inspiration of the highest be ours; may gratitude ascend to God for the innumerable tokens of his divine favor that has come to us, and may our deliberations and transactions today be calculated to strengthen the forces of our cause and to revive our zeal and personal responsibilities resting on each of us. In submitting my report today, I do so with many misgivings as on looking back over the past year I can see but very little real temperance work for all my efforts. But God knows I did what I thought was my best. There is still so much to be done and so little encouragement from those who have power to do work for our cause. Nevertheless it is gratifying to know that the past year has been one of peace and harmony. The Divisions in general are doing good work and endeavoring with honest efforts to uphold temperance and temperance work in their respective communities. All Divisions that I have corresponded with give cheering reports, and the Divisions I have visited are in good working order. For my own part I feel sorry that those who could render our cause great service are either indifferent or prefer to use their influence against us at will.

A recent decision handed down by the stipendiary Magistrate of Charlottetown demands the attention of all law abiding citizens on this fair province, and more especially does it demand consideration at the hands of this Grand Division representing as it does a membership of nearly 2000 pledged citizens. As you are aware the case was brought against the Charlottetown Club by Mr. Jenkins, the Government prosecutor, for contravening the prohibitory law of this province in selling intoxicating liquors, not only to one another, as members of the Club, but to non-members as well. At the trial, evidence was adduced which proved beyond a doubt that alcoholic liquors to the amount of \$8,000.00 with cigars thrown in, had been sold during the past year. The Magistrate very properly advised that the checks passed in payment for the liquor that a proper accounting might be made, as between its members, were equal to cash. Liquors were sold to non-members and supplied yet a so called "decision" has been handed down declaring that such sales are not a contravention of our Prohibitory Law that with our Prohibitory Statutes; such a decision reminds us of the Irishman who was foreman of the Jury in a case against a horse-thief. Said he, in rendering his decision to the court. My Lord, we find the man who stole the horse not guilty. But I must point out to you temperance men who exercise the rights of citizens in the government of this Province that one of the important factors leading to such a decision was the fact that the said Club is composed of respectable gentlemen there are governors and legislators and lawyers there right in that rum-salling club, and should not any Stipendiary Magistrate who has due regard for his peace of mind, pause and calculate the cost of finding such a band of individuals guilty of rum-salling.

Brethren to be serious, whatever feelings of respect that institution may have possessed in the past they have thrown down the gauntlet to us, and if we are men worthy of our ancestors we will take it up with our support of these gentlemen in the past has placed; them where they should continue to merit our respect and continued support. It is up to our self respect to with-hold our support from men who thus set us at defiance. I leave the matter with you to take such action as becomes the gravity of the occasion.

There is still another matter demands our consideration that is the importation of alcoholic liquors to our Province, and the handling of liquors within our drug stores. This question is not perhaps debatable at this hour as the matter is now under committee work and different opinions are to be heard regarding the nature of the petition in question. However we trust that some satisfactory conclusion of the matter may be arrived at by the Provincial Alliance in the near future until then it becomes our duty to see that the Law which we have made is rigidly enforced.

MEETING OF NATIONAL DIVISION

On July 19 in company with Mr. and Mrs J. L. Godkin, J. C. Brodie, Charlottetown and John Anderson, Kensington we attended the sixtieth annual session of the National Division Sons of Temperance which met in the City of St John, N. B. on July 20, in St David's Presbyterian Church parlor. The M. W. P., J. O. McCarthy, president. The meeting was representative and enthusiastic throughout I was greatly impressed in the manner in which the routine business of the different sessions was disposed of, everything was done with promptness and good executive skill. The Grand Division of New Brunswick did all in their power to entertain us and, showered every kindness upon us. VISITATIONS.

On Aug 23rd in company with the Grand Scribe we visited Pearly Stream Division Grandville. Owing to the very busy season the attendance was small but we were nevertheless conduced by those present that Pearly Stream has good material in its ranks and that good results may be expected from this Division.

On Aug 25th assisted by Grand Scribe we held a public temperance meeting in Darnley Hall with a view to re-suscitating Aberdeen Division I am pleased to say that our efforts were successful as a resolution was passed in which they agreed to meet in two weeks with a line to re-organize. On Sept 2nd I attended a meeting of the Prince County Temperance Alliance held in Kensington. At this meeting a petition framed by the executive of the Provincial Alliance asking our own Provincial Legislature to prevent importation of alcoholic liquors and also the removal of liquors from our drug stores a very little was accomplished at this meeting as objections were raised to certain clauses of the petition.

On Sept 3 accompanied by Bro Jno Proffitt, Spring Valley, we again drove to Darnley and succeeded in re-organizing Aberdeen Division, we are hopeful that this Division will still continue to do good work in the future. On Sept 26th, I again visited Prince William Division, Margate, as on other occasions the members exhibited a lively interest in the work. This Division has good material and shows no signs of decadence in the least after a life of 48 years.
