On the motion to appoint the committee on Public Accounts Mr. Mathison complained that in past years this committee had not discharged its proper functions. In 1907 it had been only called to meet three times and in all had sat but five hours. The chairman of that year was connected with a transaction that required investigation. Evidence was taken but the stenographer's notes were never extended. In 1908 the committee held two meetings, sitting in all three hours. It was during one of these meetings the chairman had instructed a witness not to answer questions. In 1909 under the same chairman the committee met only twice. He held this was purposely making the work of the committee a failure. At Ottawa, under the chairmanship of ex-Premier Warburton, who had won golden opinions from both parties, the public accounts committee meets from day to day. The position of chairman of this committee is a judicial one. It is claimed that inquiry had been stifled, time wasted and public rights invaded.

Premier Haszard in reply said that doubtless the Opposition leader felt better from having delivered his lecture. It was the same old story of previous sessions, and of the election campaign. Yet he hoped the committee would do so well that even its critic would have confidence in it hereafter. He agreed with the last speaker that time could be saved by having committee meetings in the morning and the House meeting promptly at 3 o'clock. The work on the Government side would be ready. He asked the members to be prompt in their attendance in order that public business might go forward without delay.

At 4 o'clock the House adjourned till three o'clock this afternoon.

WEEKLY REVIEW OF STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—The quieter and more settled conditions which developed in last week's stock market after the violent disturbance of Monday were regarded as evidence of progress in completing the precautionary steps called for by doubtful factors in the outlook and by miscalculated action in the past.

The character of the selling at the opening of the week left no room for doubt that a penalty was being paid for reckless speculative excess in the period of rising prices last year. Forced liquidation on a large scale kept conjecture busy over its sources and motives. Its volume and persistency recalled previous occasions in which subsequent history proved that liquidation by men of large wealth and supposedly ample information of the course of financial affairs was pursued. Action by the banks for recall of credits employed in excessive speculative commitments was ascribed as the direct factor in the movement.

There was no general agreement on the causes for this apparent miscarriage of large speculative movements. Such signs as have appeared, of a lull in trade activity, are interpreted both as cause and effect of the fall in prices of stocks. That these signs are peremptory symptoms of a general trade recession is a view professed by some authorities with claims to financial leadership. Better authority holds the opinion that the excess of the previous speculation itself is responsible for the violence of the reaction.

The heavy loan contraction by the banks which has accompanied the deflation of stock market values proves how largely credit resources were depleted last year from supplying new capital requirements into speculative inflation of existing stock prices. The apathy of the bond market and of the difficulty of floating new bond issues up to the present time prove the same thing. The refunding of corporate notes put out during the financial depression in 1907 and 1908 and the raising of fresh capital to extend enterprises were done at a disadvantage of last year.

The lack of abundant capital resources restricts expenditure for improvement and equipment to some extent and has its part in the present attitude of demand for materials. The stock market liquidation which has been effected is calculated to correct that condition and provide a better demand for new capital issues. The violence of the latter fall in prices of stocks aroused the suspicion that it was countenanced by large capitalist groups for the purpose of fresh accumulation of securities distributed at last year's higher prices.

A formidable impression is made by the evidences of the momentous consequences looked for, both in financial quarters and amongst officials of the government from the supreme court decisions in the American Tobacco and Standard Oil cases. The successive visits to Washington of influential financial representatives imply an attempt to arrive at an understanding with the government authorities over the alternative courses to be pursued in the event of either decision in these cases. Dissatisfaction with the results of these visits has been inferred from the action of the week's stock market, rather than from any open expression on the part of the returning visitors. Until the decision of the supreme court is formally made, it is feared that the matter will retain its disquieting influence.
