Crop Outlook In Western Canada

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 16.—Light showers to heavy rains across the three prairie provinces caused some further delay in harvesting operations but weather has been ideal for filling handling crops except in those areas where rust infection is prevalent.

Rust has seriously damaged wheat between Carman Junction and Belmont and from Greenwood to Delton. Considerable rust has shown up between Neepawa and McCreary Junction where threshing has commenced at some points.

From Regina to Melville wheat cutting is general with some threshing started at Lethbridge where stubble wheat averaged 6 bushels and summer fallow promises 10 to 15 bushels.

From Kamaska to Humboldt some threshing has been done, resulting in yields being slightly better than expected. This applies also from Canora to Hudson Bay Junction.

In the Prince Albert division cutting is 50 per cent completed with threshing just commenced. Late sown grains are still quite green and expected to yield well but will require warm weather to mature.

Southwest of Saskatoon towards Kindersley rain at a helping the feed situation but hindering harvesting. Army worms are reported around Delsie and Laura.

Wheat cutting is general in the Battleford area and better than expected yields now promise. From 3 to 15 bushels per acre appears possible in this area with cutting expected to be finished about August 20.

In the Calgary division cool weather and light showers occurred at many points. Cutting of early sown grains has started between Calgary and Hanna and will be general in a week in this territory.

On the Red Deer and Brazenau sub-divisions cutting will commence in about ten days. From Wardle to Pathlow no grain will be marketed. This applies also from Hanna to Kindersley where complete fallow exists.

In north eastern Alberta cool and showery weather has also been experienced. Cutting will be general in about a week throughout most of the area with some what better prospects than previously reported due to improvement as a result of rain. North of Edmonton weather has been mostly dry and warm. Some cutting has commenced and harvesting should be general in about a week's time.

Wheat cutting is reported in a few districts on the Grande Prairie and Smokey sub-divisions. On the Peace River sub-division grain is ripening fast and some cutting has been done.

McCormick's Ltd. Build Homes For Employees

Believed to be one of the first companies in Canada to provide homes for its employees under the Dominion Housing Act, McCormick's Limited, Biscuit and Candy Manufacturers, of London, Ontario, are now completing the first unit in a building plan that may ultimately run to one hundred or more homes.

"We believe that the trend in industry is for employers to take a greater interest in the welfare of their employees and the providing of good type of homes is one important step," J. W. Ross, Vice-President of the company, stated. "We had the land available and the Dominion Housing Act gave us the opportunity of financing the development on terms that made it comparatively easy for our employees to own their own homes."

Under the plans as prepared by the company, homes to be built will sell for a sum in the neighborhood of \$3,700.00. Built on large lots, with the average about 40 by 150 feet, the homes can be purchased with a down payment in the neighborhood of \$700.00. Succeeding payment of approximately \$25 a month will take care of principal, interest and estimated taxes.

The company, has under consideration a total of six homes. The first of these, now nearing completion, is a five room colonial style bungalow. With a living room, 18 feet long and 11 feet, 6 inches in width, provision is made for all rooms to be large and spacious.

Homes will be of fire-resisting construction, completely insulated, and with the heating plant under the American Standard Code.

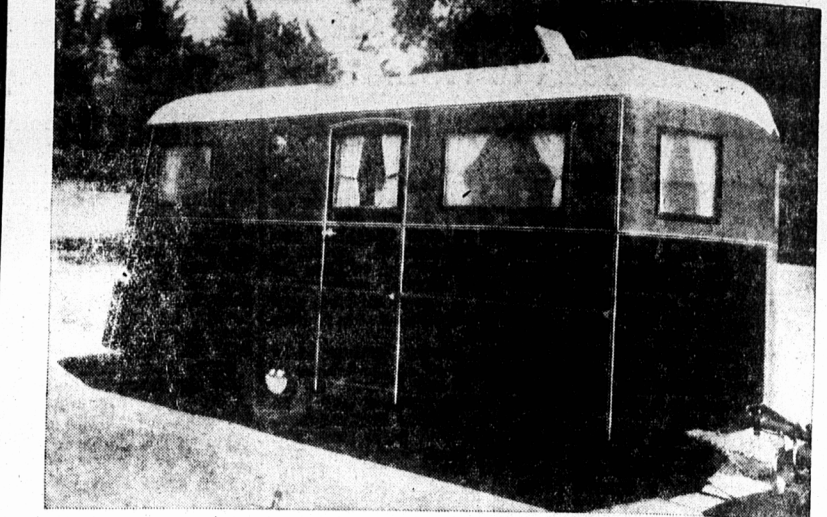
