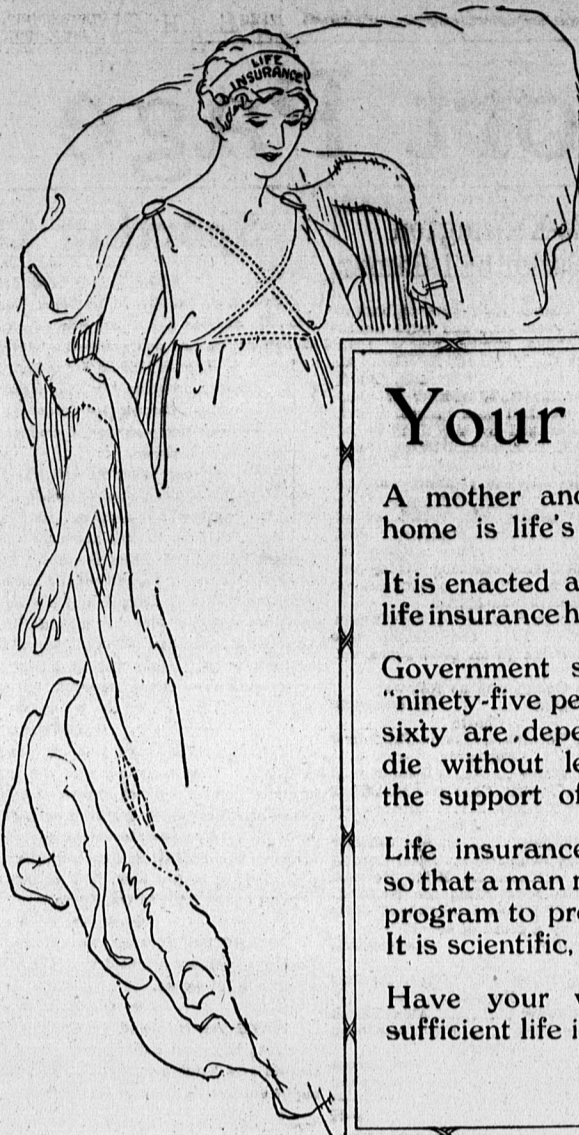

A. D. 1924 UNDER THE BRITISH FLAG

Under the above heading, we advertised in the "Halifax Chronicle", "Halifax Herald", "St. John Telegraph" and "Charlottetown Guardian" for three issues of each paper, during the week commencing January 28th to February 2nd of the year that "One of our native patriots who was successful in keeping his own eligible sons out of the firing line denied to us the privilege of handling a certain line of merchandise" (meaning Hohner Harmonicas) or "in other words refused to grant us the right of doing business in the country we fought for."

We now give the same publicity through the same channels to the following statement:

This statement referred to Mr. T. S. Pattillo and his sons, who are the principals in the firm of T. S. Pattillo & Company, Limited, and we wish now, through the same channels, to say, that we believe Mr. Pattillo was desirous of having his sins do their part—that they were examined on different occasions and each examination showed them not eligible and the statement above referred to was therefore not justifiable.

We much regret the publication of the mis-statement and desire to apologize to the gentlemen named therein. Mr. Pattillo and his sons have agreed to accept this retraction and apology with our paying their expenses in full satisfaction and that no action or actions will be taken against ourselves or the papers publishing the advertisement.
