One Lettuce For Summer Growing

There is only one lettuce on which it pays to take a chance during the hot summer months. This is the cos type usually known as romaine lettuce, a tall skinny lettuce of quite different character and shape of leaf from the usual leaf or head lettuce and their equal or superior in flavor. The leaves are long, narrow and of upright growth, enclosing the heart lightly and automatically blanching them although not forming heads. It is the most heat resistant of all the lettuces and the one lettuce to put in for late planting. It is useless to try to grow head or leaf lettuce when the warm days set in as it will spin up to seed without pausing to develop anything worth while in the way of edible foliage. The cos lettuce is considered the finest and most delicate flavored of all the lettuces by many connoisseurs. Its ease of growth is one of its most commendable features. The blanching of the leaves may be aided and hastened by trying the tips with raffia so that they may not be forced apart by winds or rains. Naturally they are closed. It is the secret of successful quality lettuce growing for those who have tried to grow head lettuce and failed to obtain good heads. It may be planted any time up to June 1. Express Cos is the earliest to come into season. It does not develop the length of leaf of some of the other varieties but is of the highest quality. One of the most popular is Trianon Cos because of its white is much like Trianon but is later and of a larger growth. These lettuces must be thinned rigorously in the rows so that each plant may have at least four inches of room in which to expand. They grow more closely than the head lettuces but this giant will have them touching in the rows. Give them extra rich soil and plenty of water as the hot weather sets in and they will put into the highest quality of lettuce in short order. Those who have grown the cos lettuce have given up the ordinary leaf lettuce for late season crops.

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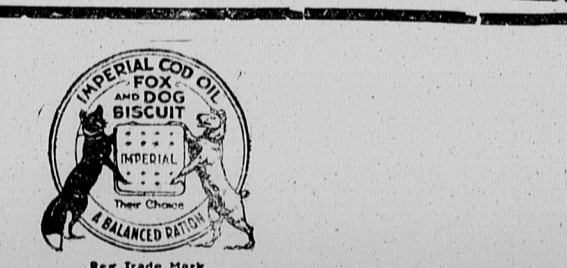

MARKET REVIEW

Figures just released through official channels at Ottawa indicate very clearly the extent of the fall-off in the export movement of Canadian grown cereals this year as compared with last, and particularly in the case of wheat and its product, **wheat flour**. It is revealed that export shipments of wheat during the period of 12 months to the end of April this year are no less than 53% below the total for the corresponding period of one year ago. A similar figure for wheat flour shows that the volume of exports of this commodity is 34% less than a year ago. Actually the exports of wheat in the 12 months were 173,121,247 bushels whereas a year ago they were 369,412,178 bushels. The decrease this year amounts to 196,290,931 bushels. In the case of wheat flour the 12 months' total for this year is 7,625,595 barrels; a year ago it was 11,516,406 barrels, the decrease being 3,891,011 barrels this year. The figures for the month of April alone reveal declines from a year ago corresponding in ratio pretty well with those for the full 12 months. April wheat exports were 3,426,406 bushels against 7,313,528 bushels in the same month of 1929. Exports of wheat flour for April were 451,305 barrels, down from 720,050 barrels one year earlier.

BRAZILIAN TRACTION

In an otherwise rather dull Canadian stock market Brazilian Traction shares came into further prominence recently less because of price movement than of volume of turnover. For some little time past the stock has been demonstrating very clearly its return to a position of market leadership, and more recently this condition has seemed more probable when contrasted with the comparatively slight interest which

other issues have been attracting. The Street is still interestedly discussing the very fine April earnings statement which the company issued last week and undoubtedly the showing both for the month and the four months has done much to redirect public attention to the particularly sound position enjoyed by this big utility enterprise. The April earnings improvement following quite closely upon the success which attended the San Paulo coffee loan has had the effect of clearing the horizon for Brazilian Traction and give promise to a possible substantial gain in the company's earning power in 1930 as compared with 1929.

INTERNATIONAL NICKEL

A summary of the exports of platinum by International Nickel Company covering the past twelve months shows some of the possibilities connected with the presence of this precious metal in substantial quantities in the Frood ore. Even without the amount of \$90,800 exported during the last month, exports for the twelve months ended March 31 amounted to \$337,748, or nearly 8 times the total of \$46,663 for the same period one year before. Large as was the total for April 1930, it was once exceeded, in September 1929, when 1,142 ounces, valued at \$91,450, were exported. The exports for April 1930, however, were larger (nearly double) than for the twelve months ended March 31, 1929, and over \$7,000 more than for the 1928 period, and nearly three times the total for the twelve months ended March 31, 1927.
