Many Gathered In Tribute To Dr. J. G. Toombs

(Moose Jaw, Sask. Exchange)

All ranks in life paid tribute to the esteem in which Captain J. Garth Toombs, M.D., was held during his lifetime, at the funeral services held on Saturday afternoon in Zion Church.

Every seat in the spacious church was occupied, and the streets were lined with people as the cortege slowly wended its way to Rosedale cemetery following the service.

Private service for the family and intimate friends was held at Bellamy's Funeral Parlor, prior to the public service in Zion Church, with Rev. T.H. Sendall, minister of Hillcrest church, officiating, and from there the casket, covered with a Union Jack and bearing the sword, cap, belt and decorations of the deceased, was borne to the church.

As the casket and mourners entered the church Prof. C.F. Nidd played the "Dead March" in "Saul," and the opening hymn was "Peace Perfect Peace." The service was conducted by Rev. J.W. Pratt, minister of Zion Church. Rev. T.H. Sendall and Rural Dean P.C. Hackworth, the last named being chaplain to the 1st King's Own Rifles of Canada (M.G.), of which battalion the deceased was medical officer.

Tribute to the devotion to duty of Captain Toombs was paid by Rev. T.H. Sendall, who chose for his subject the second chapter of Samuel and the 38th verse. Moose Jaw mourned the passing of a life full of promise which seemed to belong to all, said the preacher. Dr. Toombs never spared himself and he had won an honored place in the community. As time passed, Dr. Toombs' services to Moose Jaw would be valued more and more, said Rev. Mr. Sendall, who mentioned that at the early age of 16 the deceased enlisted for service in the Great War, was gassed overseas, and that had undermined his constitution to some extent.

"The Harmony Four," a quartette from Zion Church choir, sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" and the congregation sang the hymn "Fight the Good Fight."

Following the church service, the Moose Jaw Garrison took charge of the funeral, the Moose Jaw Garrison being lined up on Main Street under command of Lt.-Col. W.J. Hanney, V.D. officer commanding. The casket was placed on a gun carriage as the escort stood at the "present arms" and with slow tread the troops marched north on Main Street with the band of the K.O.R.C., under Bandmaster Fraser McLellan, playing the "Dead March." The band was augmented by individual members of the Salvation Army and Canadian Legion Bands. At the graveside in Rosedale cemetery Rural Dean Hackworth, chaplain of the K.O.R.C., conducted the service, during which three volleys rang out from the firing party and the buglers played "Last Post" as the casket disappeared from view.

Pallbearers for the private and public services were Dr. Leslie Hare, Fred J. Gilmour, Gordon Paul, Oswald Fyeh, Tom Rayson and George Walker, while honorary pallbearers included H. Fletcher, A.J. Pascoe and Captain Harold Davies, representing the Moose Jaw Military Institute; Dr. A.E. Chegwin, representing the Dental Society; Dr. G.S. Goodwin, Dr. C.H. Freeman, Dr. H. Michaud, Dr. P.D. McCullough, Dr. N.E. Betzner, Dr. J.E. Bloomer, Dr. H. Gordon Young, Dr. T.M. Leask, Dr. R.B. Burwell, Dr. G.A. Parkins, Dr. W.H. Wardell, Dr. B.M. Bayly, Dr. T.R. Underhill, Dr. Hugh Young.

T. Meadowcroft, R.S.M. D. G. Cooper, R.Q.M.S. W. Howland.

Honorary military pallbearers included Major A.R. Rorison, Major T.C. Borradaile, Captain F. Bailey, Captain J.C. McTavish, Captain R. Fyeh and Lieut. K. Calder.

Constables G.M. McKay and H. S. Cooper represented the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Dr. Toombs being medical officer of the detachment.

The casket was banked with wreaths, which bore eloquent tribute to the esteem in which Dr. Toombs was held in Moose Jaw. To mourn their loss the deceased leaves his widow, one son David; his mother resident in Winnipeg; one brother, Wendall, of Winnipeg; and three sisters, Mrs. H.W. McKay, of Mount Stewart, Prince Edward Island; Mrs. P.H. Steart, of Georgetown, P.E.I.; and M. J. Marston, of Winnipeg. Nine years ago on Saturday he was predeceased by his father.

The General Hospital Board was represented by Andrew Tait and the hospital staff by J.S. Williams, superintendent; Miss M.E. Ingham, superintendent of nurses, representing the General Hospital nurses. The Moose Jaw Registered Nurses' Association was represented by Mrs. J. 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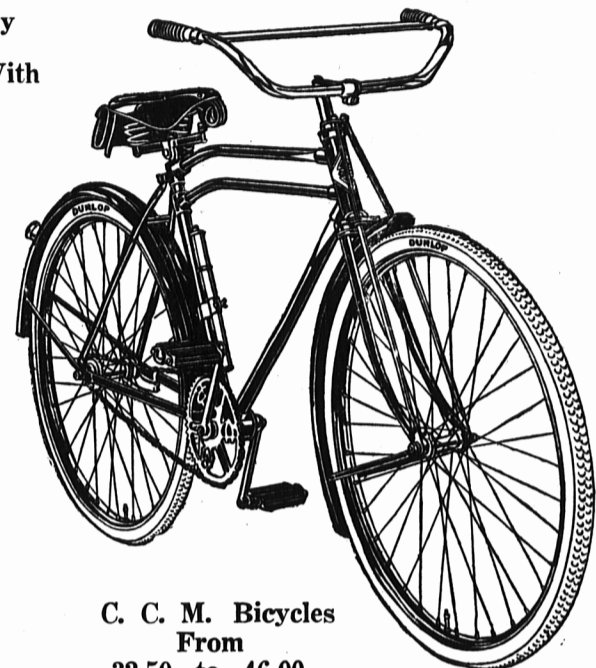

Nationalization Of Air Urged

LONDON, May 18—(OP-Havas)—Operation of the Canadian National Steamship Line to the West Indies by the Dominion Government was cited in the House of Commons today in support of a Labor motion, subsequently defeated, urging nationalization of Great Britain's subsidized air lines. The motion, defeated 173-108, was presented during debate on the

bill to increase annual government subsidies to civil air lines from £1,000,000 to £3,000,000 (\$5,000,000 to \$15,000,000) in which Sir Kingsley Wood and Captain Harold H. Balfour made their debut as secretary and undersecretary for air.

The bill, embodying recommendations made in the Lord Canden committee report on civil aviation was adopted on second reading. Frederick Montague, sponsor of the Labor motion, argued that civil aviation was a monopoly in Great Britain, inasmuch as the subsidies are reserved for a small

number of specialized companies for development of certain air lines. He referred to the Canadian National Steamship Line to support his contention that state run services could be justified.

The line, he pointed out, while running at a loss, was operated by the Canadian Government to prevent the West Indies from falling into the commercial orbit of the United States.

Montreal Doctor Is Awarded Dalby Prize

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, May 18—The Royal Society of Medicine today informed Dr. W. J. McNally, oto-laryngologist at Royal Victoria Hospital, that he had been awarded the Dalby prize for the best work in his field during the past five years. Established 15 years ago and

world-wide in its scope, the prize comes to the North American continent for the first time. The award, consisting of 100 guineas about \$25, is based on general work done in the department of oto-laryngology and is awarded every five years. A graduate of Dalhousie University, Dr. McNally received his master's degree in 1925 and his doctorate in 1928 and nine years later was conferred the degree of doctor of science by the same university.
