James McGregor, Henry Stetson and Edward Bryan, of Union Vale, Thomas Dennis, of O'Leary Station and Thomas Harris, of O'Leary Road as the provisional directors; "The New Haven Fox Co., Ltd.," with a capital of \$50,000, divided into 2,000 shares of \$25 each, its chief place of business to be in Charlottetown, and Messrs. Septimus H. Colwell, of New Haven, Finley McFadyen, of Riverdale, Allan Rogerson, of Gamble's Corner, Queens, and S. A. McDonald, of the city, as the first directors; "The Record Fox and Fur Co., Ltd.," with a proposed capital of \$400,000, divided into 40,000 shares of the value of \$10 each, with its head office to be in Charlottetown and the following to be its provisional directors: Dr. S. R. Jenkins, Messrs. Daniel A. McKinnon, Charles Lyons, Ernest Kemp, Samuel Craig, Robert N. Tomlins and A. J. McAdam, all of Charlottetown.

FIRE WASTE.—The fire waste in each province for 1913 has been estimated in The Monetary Times as follows:—Ontario, \$8,182,550; Quebec, \$4,381,271; Alberta, \$4,012,221; Manitoba, \$2,202,208; Saskatchewan, \$2,303,319; Nova Scotia, 1,588,730; British Columbia, \$1,536,858; New Brunswick, \$1,084,370; Prince Edward Island, \$455,091; making a total in all of \$26,316,618. By the above estimate it will be seen that P. E. Island has had less loss through fire than of the other nine provinces.

Consul, Mr. Wesley Frost, reprinted from the Daily Circular and Trade Reports, issued by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce and Labor, Washington, D. C. In it the Island is given great credit for the phenomenal expansion that is taking place in the industry and it praises the activity of Island ranchers. There are other articles in the issue dealing with the fox dividends, the big advance in prices of furs; an interesting write-up from the pen of Mr. R. L. Cleveland that appeared in the Boston American, and a brief history and review of the important and profitable industry by Publicity Agent, Mr. J. E. B. McCready. It also contains extracts from the Guardian published in its issues at various times of dividends from different ranches, the million dollar train, the present value of the industry, and speaks of the money stringency that prevails elsewhere being absent from this province. There is an editorial reference to the Tuplin ranch also. Altogether the edition is one of the most interesting papers received at the office and is well worth perusing.

A WELCOME CONDEMNATION

Canon Newbolt in a recent sermon in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, England, made a very plain reference to two aspects of present day life: the modern dance and the society novel, and he expressed the opinion that neither of these would be allowed to disgrace our civilization for a moment if professed Christians were to refuse to allow their daughters to participate in anything wrong. The Canon will remark that a few more consistent Godfearing lives would yet save England from the deadly peril which waits upon godless materialism. He has here put his finger upon one of the weak spots of modern life, the freedom with which young people are allowed by their parents to take part in forms of pleasure which cannot but be destructive of modesty, simplicity, and moral strenuousness.
