MADE PROGRESS

THE HAGUE, Jan. 9.—French and German delegates to the second reparations conference today made progress toward an agreement on the thorny question of sanctions or measures to be taken in the event that Germany should default in her payments. The progress was made at an interview attended by Premier Tardieu and Foreign Minister Briand for France and Foreign Minister Curtius and Minister of Economics Wirth for Germany. It was understood

that the French asked only that something be inserted in the protocol as to what may properly be done if some succeeding German Government should refuse to execute the Young Plan. The French, it was also understood have virtually abandoned the idea of military occupation of a sanction. The Germans it is stated agreed to drop their original demand that the conference protocol be written without mention of sanctions. The main delegates of the six principal powers met to discuss financial questions to be cleared up before the Young Plan will be ready for ratification. The Bulgarian reparations settlement negotiations were still deadlocked. Bulgaria remained firm in her attitude that she could not pay above 10,000,000 gold francs annually without a five year suspension of payment. The Hungarian settlement will be taken up in detail Saturday.
