The death occurred recently at Truro, of J. Harvey Kent, aged 62. The deceased was a prominent Y. M. C. A. worker, and was a delegate to Charlottetown during the Maritime Convention.

The death of Mrs. Robert Fyfe of Stanley Bridge occurred at her home on Mar. 22nd after a very brief illness. Although not enjoying the best of health for a number of years, her death was unexpected and was a great shock to her family and friends. Deceased was naturally of a cheerful, happy disposition and endeared herself to all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. She was 65 years of age and leaves six daughters and three sons to mourn: Mrs. C. E. Hobart, Hazona; Mrs. Miles Doherty, Baddeck; C. B. Mrs. Kenneth Clarke, Colo.; Alice, teacher in Kingston and Belle and Edna at home. The sons are Arthur and James in Alta; and Miller at home. The funeral services which were conducted by the Rev. H. B. Gough, Kensington, took place, Wed. Mar. 25th. The remains were laid to rest beside those of her husband who died two years ago. The pall-bearers were her nephews.

Yesterday morning under the influence of tide and wind the ice in the West River, broke loose from its winter moorings. When it got under way with the outgoing tide it moved in a solid mass that there was no resisting with anything less than an icebreaker. Shortly before the ice broke away a new boat had left Rocky Point containing the following gentlemen Messrs John McMillan, M. L. A., James McLean in H. M. Customs, city, Wm. McDonald, Canoe Cove, Wm. Mullins, Charlottetown, and S. T. Currie, Rocky Point. They were bound for Charlottetown and when they started on their journey there was practically clear water before them. When nearly half way over they encountered the first of the river ice now rapidly floating out to sea. Their efforts to evade it were of no avail and their boat was caught in the mass and carried out towards the harbor's mouth. There was great danger that the boat would be smashed among the pressing blocks of heavy ice and in order to avoid that calamity they had to jump out, haul the boat on the ice and drift with it until they had a favorable opportunity to make a landing which they did at last at Murphy's Point on the other side of the harbor. They had a rather risky trip and before they landed all had been in the water more or less. They finally arrived in this City after walking from their landing place around by the Hillsboro Bridge.

Josiah Gilbert, serving a term of life imprisonment in the penitentiary there for the murder of Barrett Henderson of North River, P. E. Island, is dangerously ill and there are but slight hopes of his recovery. Gilbert was brought here from Regina early in 1907 when he commenced life imprisonment sentence which was imposed upon him. He is over seventy years of age, and is the oldest life prisoner in Canada.

Later advices from Edmonton state that Josiah Gilbert died in the penitentiary at that place on March 24th.

Mrs. J. S. Boyd, of Moncton, has received word of the death in Ash-tabula, Ohio, of her sister, Mrs. (Rev.) J. M. Forbes. The deceased lady had been in failing health for the last year or two and was in Moncton last summer on her way to her old home in Prince Edward Island, where she spent some weeks. Her health was not permanently improved, however, and shortly after her return to Ohio she was taken seriously ill. Mrs. Forbes is survived by her husband, who is rector of St. Peter's Church of England at Ash-tabula; also one son, Percy M., and four daughters, Elsie, Blanche, Jennie and Edith. Mr. Forbes was formerly rector of the Church of England at Alberton, P. E. Island.

Norman W. Latta, of Montreal, agent of the Canada Paper Company, and Elsie Elder, daughter of Alexander Moody, Halifax, were the principals in a very pretty wedding last Wednesday morning in St. George's church, the rector, the Rev. H. W. Cunningham, officiating. It was a very quiet wedding, the bride and groom being unattended. Miss Moody who has enjoyed great popularity, wore a wedding gown of brown cloth, with hat of corresponding shade, her bouquet being of bride roses and lilies of the valley. Immediately after the wedding Mr. and Mrs. Latta left for the wedding trip, upon which they are followed by the best wishes of a host of friends. Mr. Latta is well known in Charlottetown, and also in different parts of the Province as he visits here each year regularly in the interest of his firm.

The Assembly Hall of the School for the Blind at Halifax was filled, galleries and all, Friday evening with an audience among whom were a large number of ladies, illustrating the very attractive character of the literary treats for which the Canadian Club has already established a well earned reputation in Halifax.
