A VERY enthusiastic meeting of Victoria Division was held last night in Wright's Hall. Every chair was filled and some could not even find seats short of the platform. Several new members were initiated and more propositions were received. Nearly an hour was spent in entertainment after the order of business had been gone through with.

The railway lines of the province are gradually being opened up. The line which has been opened up with most difficulty is the N. B. and P. E. I. from Sackville to Cape Tormentine. Work is still going on there, and the men have only reached as yet a point some seven miles beyond Sackville. Since Jan. 25th something less than \$6,000 has been expended in opening up the Shore Line, and with very unsatisfactory results.—Moncton Transcript.

A PLEASANT event took place in Cra-paud on Wednesday last at the residence of Mark and Mrs. Best when their daughter Miss Carrie was united in marriage to J. Avread MacVittie of the same place. The bride who was attired in a pretty costume was attended by Miss Gertrude Callbeck, Summerside, while Parker Rogerson of Victoria was groomsmen. Rev. J. Clark, M. THE slaughter of caribou along the western coast of Newfoundland this winter is tremendous, says the North Sydney Herald. In some favorite areas the deer walk down to the seaside and eat the kelp, and the coast folk come to these places in schooners with crews of men and carry out the work of destruction on a most appalling scale. They have surrounded herds of caribou and killed and wounded them with shot until masses of meat were accumulated which are so large that in many instances they will never be eaten. This is a very serious matter, and so bare-faced has the slaughter been that the schooners have moored near those inlets and the crews have lived on board, making expeditions inland after the deer from day to day as the weather served.

MOCK PARLIAMENT.

The House met again last night at 8 o'clock. The Deputy Speaker (Mr. Harris) announced the Cabinet in a message from His Excellency as follows:

- President of the Privy Council and Minister of Justice—C. Gavan Duffy.
- Minister of Finance—J. Ewen Matthews.
- Minister of Public Works—Vernon Crockett.
- Minister of Railways and Canals—Ernest Rice.
- Minister of Marine and Fisheries—George W. McPhee.

The Leader of the Government introduced the resolution favoring the admission of Newfoundland as a Province of Canada on the terms proposed. He was answered by Mr. McCallum from the Opposition. Mr. Crockett the seconder, and Mr. Moulie supported the resolution on the Government side and Messrs. McLeod and Meikle opposed it from the Opposition side.

The first clause of the resolution was adopted and its further consideration adjourned until next Monday night.
