The groom was assisted by his cousin, Mr. Elmer Campbell of Middleton. **EXTERNAL AUDIT SHOWS A SURPLUS**

**Revision Of Accounting System, Readjustment Of Sinking Funds, Revaluation Of Certain Assets And Curtailment Of Expenditure Wherever Possible Are Recommended In Detailed Report Submitted To Mayor And City Council**

A surplus of \$673,124.14 for the year 1931 is shown in the accounts of the City of Charlottetown in the report of the External Auditor, Mr. Donald S. Hart, C. A., Halifax, whose detailed report was submitted by Coun. Kennedy, chairman of the Finance Committee, at last night's meeting of the City Council.

All assets and liabilities, as far as the auditor has been able to ascertain, are included in the report except the current assets and liabilities of the Water and Sewerage Commission and the Board of School Trustees.

"The City's bonded indebtedness," the report says, "appears to be fairly large and it would seem advisable to revise the Sinking Fund provisions, increasing the annual appropriations. Further capital expenditure, financed by borrowings, should unless absolutely essential, be discontinued for the present."

With reference to the surplus or excess of asset and expenditure over liabilities, the report says: "Just how much of this amount (\$163,124.22) should be allotted to 'Capital' and how much to 'Revenue,' it would be difficult to say at this time, as the 'Capital' and 'Revenue' accounts have apparently not been kept completely separate in the past."

Cash receipts and disbursements were examined in detail for the 1931 period and found to be in order.

Cash in Sinking Fund accounts amounted in all to \$110,108.59; and Dominion of Canada bonds in safety deposit box at the Royal Bank of Canada on Sinking Fund account were "examined, counted, and found to amount to \$141,000, all as previously reported by the City Treasurer."

The total debentures outstanding at the end of 1931 amounted to \$1,650,600.

"Due to scanty records," says the report, "and in some instances practically no records at all, a great deal of difficulty was experienced."

Mr. J. J. McKinnon, Secretary of Oddfellows for the Maritime Provinces, left on Saturday for Denver, Col. where he will attend a meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which meets there this week.

Miss Peggy Joyce who has been visiting Charlottetown as the guest of Miss Marie Mutch is leaving Wednesday morning for Halifax en route to her home in St. John's Newfoundland.

Mr. Leslie Hughes arrived in the city Saturday evening from Dalhousie, N. S. on a short visit to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Hughes, Prince Street.

**Sinking Fund**

The total Sinking Fund, including Dominion of Canada bonds at par, is given at \$251,106.59 on Dec. 31, 1931. On this basis the net bonded indebtedness of the City at the end of 1931 is found to be \$1,399,493.41.

The report notes that several classes of debentures have no sinking funds. This is clearly set out in the published annual statements of the City, as in page 52 of the 1931 report. In that schedule a fairly complete picture of the situation is given and similar particulars were furnished in the 1929 and 1930 published accounts.

The classes of debentures for which no Sinking Funds have been provided are: Civic Purposes, \$183,600; Schools; civic issues, \$60,500; School Board, \$73,500. In the first two classes are reissues and may be so continued without Sinking Fund provisions. The School Board debentures were issued by the School Board under powers conferred upon them by the School Act.

"It is understood" says the report, "that it is planned to begin Sinking Fund payments in respect to City Hall annex debentures, during 1932 and the Housing Commission debentures should be taken care of from repayments of funds loaned to borrowers."

The total bonds for Water and Sewerage requirements outstanding on Dec. 31, 1931, amounted to \$381,500. These debentures fall due at irregular periods and for varying amounts from 1932 to 1960. The present Sinking Fund amounts to \$70,249.07, and the annual deposit is \$4,500. By 1960 the accruals will be sufficient to pay off all except approximately \$144,000 of the present Sewerage debenture indebtedness. Beginning in 1940 further sinking funds will be required in addition to

the yearly installment of \$4,500, to take care of debentures re-issued.

The Water and Sewerage debentures at present have a joint Sinking Fund. It is suggested that the fund be divided, and apportioned between the two classes of debentures.

The Permanent Works debentures outstanding Dec. 31, 1931, amounted to \$790,000. The total sinking fund provided therefor was \$143,121.20, including cash in bank and Dominion of Canada bonds. The present annual Sinking Fund installment is \$13,000. Additional sinking funds will be required, beginning in 1942, for these requirements.

A summary follows on the report of other debenture issues, as at Dec. 31, 1931:

Storm Water Sewers: Amount accumulated, \$28,602.89, including \$25,000 Dominion of Canada bonds. Debentures outstanding, \$52,500. The present annual sinking fund installment is \$1,945. Apparently this annual payment, if continued regularly until 1941, when the last of the debentures mature, will amount, together with the total sum already in the fund, to over \$10,000 more than will be required for the purpose of retiring the \$52,500 debentures now afloat. It would, accordingly, be in order to reduce this yearly installment to \$1,063, beginning with the current 1932 payment; and if desired the difference \$878 could be applied to increase one of the other funds. Permanent Works for instance.

Fire Department: Debentures afloat for apparatus amounted to \$27,000, maturing at various times between 1941 and 1951. The amount in the fund was \$3,068. Deposits to the credit of the fund are at present being made at the rate of \$270 per year, in respect to debentures issued prior to 1931. During the latter year a new issue of \$15,500 was marketed but sinking fund payments will not apparently begin until 1932. In order to retire all these debentures as they fall due, the sum of \$840 should each year be paid into Sinking Funds until and including 1951.

City Market: Debentures outstanding, \$1,500. Total accumulated in Sinking Fund, \$900.96. Installments are being paid into the fund at the rate of \$65 per year. Apparently this fund will overrun. Installments at the rate of \$21 per year beginning in 1932 will provide a sufficient sum to retire these debentures at maturity in 1940.

Patriotic Fund: Total debentures \$4,000. Sinking Fund accumulations, \$1,740.31. Annual payments into the fund are being made at the rate of \$95 per year, which apparently will not produce a sufficient sum in 1942 to retire the issue. Accordingly beginning in 1932, the Sinking Fund installment should be increased to \$110, or \$15 additional per year, and so continued until 1942.

Soldiers' Monument: Sinking Fund accumulations \$2,741.42; debentures outstanding, \$11,500. Present annual Sinking Fund installments \$347. These yearly payments into the fund should be increased to \$417 (or \$73 additional) beginning in 1932, if it is desired to retire this issue in full, at maturity, in 1944.

Public Library: Debentures afloat \$10,000; Sinking Fund accumulations, \$683.32. Installments are being paid into the fund at the rate of \$335 per year. This rate, while approximately correct, on the basis of 4 per cent earnings, indicates a shortage of about \$55. If the installments were increased \$2 per year the fund should be sufficient in 1940, to retire the issue in full.

City Hall Annex: Debentures afloat \$20,000, issued during July 1931, at 20 years. At present there is no Sinking Fund for this issue. In order to retire the issue in full at maturity dates, \$772 should be deposited annually until Dec. 1950.

School Board issue: If it is desired to create a Sinking Fund for this issue, which at the end of 1931

amounted to \$73,500, it will be necessary to annually set aside \$1,000 beginning in 1932 and continuing until 1943 when sufficient will have accumulated to retire about \$19,600 debentures as they fall due, provided \$50,000 are reissued in July 1942 and about \$1,000 in July 1948.

City Purpose Issue: The total of this group of debentures (including \$1,000 added to adjust an additional \$1,000 apparently omitted in 1916 or earlier) amounted to \$183,600 at the end of last year. No Sinking Funds have been provided therefor. An annual deposit sufficient to retire these debentures as they fall due would probably be too heavy a burden to carry but it would appear advisable to try to reduce the total as much as possible. Specific reissues are suggested, together with the annual deposit of \$1,500, beginning in 1932, to meet this obligation.

Suggestions are made for a re-arrangement of the present Sinking Fund installments, which would with a total additional annual payment of \$453,000, place the funds upon a much more satisfactory basis, subject of course to such further Sinking Fund installments as may be necessary, as the years go by, in respect to new and re-issues.

An additional \$5,000 per annum would enable the City to begin paying off the three issues or classes of debentures for which there are at present no Sinking Funds, namely, Civic School, School Board and Civic Purposes debentures.

**Accrued Debenture Interest**

The amount of accrued (coupon) debenture interest at the end of December, 1931, was \$20,787.45, as closely as could be calculated. This amount is exclusive of interest then accrued on Housing Commission bonds on which the interest accruals are shown separately on the Balance Sheet. It is likewise exclusive of interest accrued from last coupon payment dates to Dec. 31 on Water and Sewerage bonds.

The Bank overdraft, \$60,162.70 included at the same figure as that indicated in the 1931 published report, which was in accordance with the Civic bank book.

Total assets of the City are listed at \$1,202,304. The calculation is based on valuations many of which, the report suggests, should be gone into carefully and the necessary readjustments made in respect thereto in the City's records. A careful inventory and revaluation of the movable property of the City should, the report suggests, be done this year and annually thereafter at the close of each year's business.

**Tax Rolls Satisfactory**

"Compared with various other towns and cities with which the writer is somewhat familiar," continues the report, "your tax rolls, in so far as real and personal property assessments are concerned, are in comparatively good conditions." Discount rates, it is noted, have been amended this year and placed on a much more equitable basis. Assessment valuations, it is suggested, should be carefully considered in all cases before being included for rate making purposes.

"The accounting system," the report continues, "in the writer's opinion, requires complete revision, in so far as the City Treasurer's office is concerned. The general ledger should be re-arranged and the accounts re-classified, additional accounts opened, etc.; and the subsidiary books should be remodelled, so as to provide for a more complete classification of receipts and expenditure, and thus enable the monthly totals to be carried into the general ledger and more readily distributed."

"Summing up" the report concludes, "your various immediate major problems seem to centre around either one or the other of the following:

(a) The accounting system, which needs radical revision; and

(b) Finances, or the need of careful administration and supervision in respect thereto, curtailment of expenditure, both 'capital' and 'ordinary' whenever and wherever possible, readjustment of Sinking Funds, re-valuation of certain assets, etc., as well as other matters referred to in this report.
