Remanded To The Supreme Court On Burglary Charge

At the police court yesterday, Ralph Harris, a young man about eighteen years of age, of this city, appeared before the City Magistrate charged with breaking and entering Reddin Bros. Drug Store on Saturday morning March 31st. Evidence of Mr. Ivan Reddin and Police Officers Allan McInnis, was taken. Harris submitted no defence. He was remanded to Supreme Court.

Harris was caught red-handed burglarizing the store about 1 a.m. Saturday, March 31st by Mr. Ivan Reddin, who suspected something wrong when he noticed, at closing time a bolt or lock open on a door in the Rose and Grey Tea Rooms. The bolt was found to be open and goods had been disappeared. In one instance a young man who hangs around the premises was apprehended but given another chance by the manager.

Waiting to see what would happen, Mr. Reddin turned out the lights and remained in the store and before long he heard someone on the premises. Quickly turning on the lights he found the intruder going through the pen and pencil case. He immediately ran for the stairs leading to the Rose and Grey where he was followed and seized by Mr. Reddin who phoned for the police.

Harris when caught, had in his possession a revolver, a small pistol, a gimlet, a pair of pliers and three gold pencils identified as similar to those sold in the store. Mr. Bentley K.C. appeared yesterday for the accused, and the Attorney General for the Crown.

ROTARY ADDRESS

The feature of the Rotary luncheon programme yesterday was a most interesting address by C. M. Williams, Chief Supervisor of the Soldiers' Settlement Board for Prince Edward Island. He touched on the salient points of the Soldiers' Settlement Act, passed in 1918, and which has been amended from time to time, the most important amendment being passed last year when the interest free exemption period was extended. Mr. Williams then spoke of the great success of the work of the Board, and detailed the procedure preliminary to placing soldiers on the land, every safeguard being provided for the protection of the soldier and the Board. In answer to a waste of money Mr. Williams stated that the Board is so successful that the good on the properties it has salvaged and resold. The administration costs are very low, a little over 7 1/2 of 1 per cent. There are 300 settlers on the island and their lands approximate \$800,000. Their annual payments have been steadily increasing. Mr. Williams then described the work which is being done by the Board in connection with Federal Immigration work and the steps taken to bring out to Canada such desirable settlers as a number of the 2000 young English officers demobilized from the Indian army, also a number of 5,000 ex-naval and military officers in Great Britain. The Board has committees working among these men in England and India, and are prepared to extend financial assistance to them on the same terms as are now enjoyed by Canadians. Mr. Williams was heartily thanked for his splendid address. The musical programme yesterday included excellent saxophone solos (conducted) by Mr. Bert Green.
