the club will commence.-S.

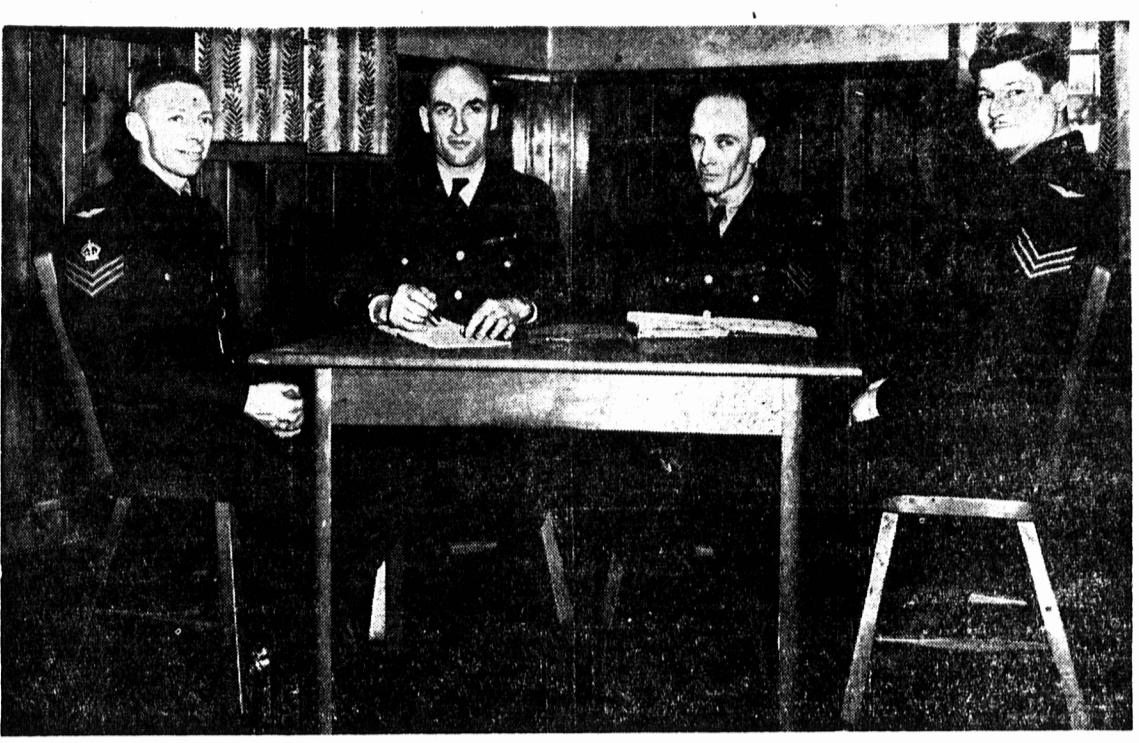

More Entries In
Civic Contest
At Summerside
Several more citizens have
announced over the weekend their
intention to be candidates in the
February 7th civic election in
Summerside.
Mr. Donald Baker has indicated
his intention of contesting the
mayoralty, thereby entering what
may possibly be a three-way con-
test.
Councillor T. D. Morrison, who
it is understood gave some consid-
eration to running for mayor, has
decided to contest his old Center
Ward seat on the Council.
Mr. Willard Muttart has announ-
ced that he will contest the East
Ward against Councillor J. Lloyd
Gorrie. These announcements in-
dicate that there will be a contest
for the mayoralty and one in the
East Ward for councillor. So far,
Councillor Morrison is the only
candidate in the field in the Cen-
ter Ward and Mr. Clarence Steele's
apparently has no opposition in
the West Ward.

Alberton Town
Council Meeting
The regular meeting of the Al-
berton Town Council was held
Monday evening with Mayor Pro-
tem president and Councillors Mor-
gan, Corbett, Currie, Weeks and
Matthews in attendance. Bills
amounting to \$148.27 were order-
ed paid.
Correspondence from Mr. Wil-
liam Albert gave notice that in
thirty days action will be taken
by him concerning a bill allegedly
owed him by the town. It was
moved, seconded and carried that
this notice be received and filed.
A group of three citizens wait-
ing upon the Council to express
the desire of a number of town-
sfolk that a house-to-house canv-
ass be made in aid of a family
who has recently lost its home and
contents. They also expressed a
desire that the Town be repre-
sented on a committee to make
this canvass. Councillors Weeks
and Matthews volunteered to give
assistance.
Mr. Gordon Coffin, the new
auditor, who was present at the
meeting, was empowered to pre-
pare a set of books and to insti-
tute a new system of book-keep-
ing for the Town.
There was a suggestion that if
meetings of the Council were held
in the Court House there would be
more room to accommodate citi-
zens who might wish to attend,
but a decision to change the place
of meeting was deferred until re-
pairs to the Court House are com-
pleted.
The Street Committee reported
that streets had been dragged
before last freeze-up.
In consideration of some com-
plaints that have been heard,
Councillor Weeks was requested
to contact the Telephone Com-
pany and ask that the fire alarm
service be improved. It was sug-
gested that the main siren be
blown intermittently for at least
3 minutes whenever there is a fire.
On motion the purchase of two
hundred feet of fire hose was
authorized.
A contact with the new police-
man, which has been approved by
two Councillors, was passed by
the meeting.
On motion it was directed that
deeds be obtained for two pieces
of land purchased from Mrs.
Burke and from Mr. Weeks.

Canada Removes Threat
To Colonial Airlines

OTTAWA, Jan. 13 (CP) -
The Air Transport Board today
removed its threat to suspend the
license of Colonial Air Lines of
New York which has challenged
the validity of a Canada-United
States air transport pact.
At the same time, the Govern-
ment of the two countries an-
nounced agreement to refrain from
further implementation of the
pact until the U.S. Supreme
Court hears Colonial's charges and
brings down a ruling. The case
opens in Washington Feb. 17.
Colonial will continue to operate
exclusively on the disputed Mont-
real-New York air route, without
the proposed competition of Trans-
Canada Air Lines, until the court
brings down a ruling. This is not
expected until March or even later.
Thus, Colonial appears to have
emerged victorious so far in the
struggle.

The twenty-fourth annual meet-
