"Annabelle's Affairs," based on Clare Kummer's hilarious New York stage success, "Good Gracious Annabelle" made an auspicious debut at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday and was greeted with an overwhelming wave of hearty laughs.

In bringing the play to the screen, none of the fine comedy was lost-rather there seems to be an added spontaneity to the ludicrous situations, an added sparkle to the wit in the dialog, and there are just enough heart touching dramatic situations to give the proper coloring and shading to the nonsense in the comedy.

Leading roles were enacted by Victor McLaglen and Jeanette MacDonald and for the first time in his screen career, McLaglen gets the girl. He gave an intelligent and sincere portrayal of the primitive and ignorant miner who marries the girl and later becomes rich and so intriguing that his wife, from whom he has been separated, fail to recognize him and falls in love with him. His transition from the uncouth illiterate miner to the Beau Brummell is a masterpiece.

Miss MacDonald, who first rose in fame in "The Love Parade," is most charming in the role of the madcap girl. The feminine portion of the audience were particularly delighted by the fascinating display of lingerie and the gowns worn by Miss MacDonald throughout the picture.

To Roland Young should be given credit for many of the laughs enjoyed in "Annabelle's Affairs." Young has that indefinable knack of squeezing the last laugh out of every situation or line that is possible to be gotten. His intonations, his mannerism are all inimitably funny. Ruth Warren, in the slayery role, proven herself a comedienne of rare talent.

Fox officials picked a real supporting cast in Sam Hardy, Sally Blane, Hank Mann, Joyce Compton and Jed Prouty and everyone of them live up to past excellent reputations.

Annabelle's Affairs is an excellent tonic for the blues.

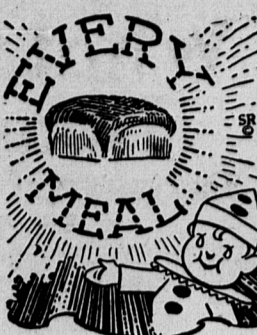
John Hausworth, a bootmaker here in Civil War days, made the boots for Miller and charged \$5 for them.

QUEBEC

since 1892 will end on Monday with voting in all of Quebec's ninety constituencies. Records show that not since Confederation, 1867, has a contest taken place in a Quebec general election in every seat.

In 1892 only one member was elected without a contest. Elections up to 1927, produced a varying number of proclamations, the high-water mark being in 1919 when forty-four Liberal supporters of the Premier, Sir Lomer Gouin, were returned unopposed and his Government was guaranteed a majority on nomination date, an unprecedented event in Canadian history. The number of seats in the Legislature at the time was 85.

Thirty-Four Years In Power

The Liberals have held the reins of government for 34 years in Quebec, the last Conservative Government, that of Hon. E. J. Flynn, went out of office in 1897, when the Liberals were swept into power on the wave of popular support which had helped send Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his adherents in triumph to Ottawa the year before.

Since then Quebec has had four Premiers, all supported by large majorities, Hon. F. G. Marchand, 1887 to 1900, Hon. S. N. Parent, 1900 to 1905, Hon. Sir Lomer Gouin, 1905 to 1920, Hon. L. A. Taschereau, 1920 to the present time.

Mr. Taschereau's government had a majority of 61 after the last election in 1927 and the standing at dissolution on July 30 last was: Government, 65; Independent Liberals, 4; Conservative, 11; Labor, 1; vacant, 4. Five new seats are selecting members for the first time in the present election.

Candidates In Every Riding

On Monday 197 candidates will be voted on. The Liberals and Conservatives, for the first time on record, both have a candidate each in every riding. There are three Laborites and the balance is composed of Independents. Premier Taschereau is fighting his third campaign as Premier and his eighth as a member of the House. He was elected as member for Montmorency in 1900 and has therefore been 31 years in public life. Camille Houde, leader of the opposition, is conducting his first general election in that position, though he has been twice elected to the legislature for Montreal-St. Mary. He is also Mayor of Montreal.

New Faces

Whatever happens on Monday the new legislature is bound to contain many new faces. Of the 85 members who composed the last House, fourteen Liberals and one Conservative have been removed by death or translation to the Upper House. Seventeen members did not seek re-election in the present campaign. A new minister is seeking a seat, Hon. Gordon Scott, Minister without portfolio and prospective provincial treasurer. He was appointed last year, but was defeated in Huntingdon in a by-election. Mr. Scott then went to the legislative council, Quebec's Upper House, but resigned after dissolution to contest Montreal-St. George, against the late member, C. E. Gault, the financial critic on the opposition side of the House. Hon. Alfred Ledou, Minister without portfolio, decided to leave public life and has left a vacancy in the Taschereau Government.

The province is experiencing its first August election and fine weather has prevailed. The tensest advantage of the federal of

Both Premier Taschereau and Mr. Houde have made tours of the province, the Premier opening his campaign in Matane and afterwards speaking in Quebec, Montreal, Chicoutimi and the eastern townships. He is to speak in Three Rivers on Saturday and in his own county on Sunday. Mr. Houde has addressed meetings in the eastern part of the Province, Montreal, the eastern townships, Quebec, Hull and Three Rivers. Hon. J. Adelard Godbout, who came into the Taschereau Government as Minister for Agriculture in 1929, has also spoken in many parts of the province. Prominent federal leaders, members and former Ministers have been heard in their own constituencies. Hon. Ernest Lepointe in Quebec, Hon. P. J. Cardin in Richelieu, and Hon. Ferand Rinfret in Montreal.

Mr. Houde, when he formally opened his campaign in Montreal received telegrams of endorsement from Premier Bennett and Cabinet members from the Province of Quebec. Members of the Federal Government have also spoken in their own ridings. Hon. Arthur Sauve, Postmaster General, in Two Mountains, Hon. Alfred Duralieu, Minister of Marine, in Vercheres, and Hon. Maurice Dupre, Solicitor General, in Quebec.

Mr. Taschereau has asked for a renewal of the people's confidence on the Government's record and has stressed the legislation which has been passed dealing progressively with liquor, power, the schools, roads, and workmen's compensation. He has pointed to the constant yearly surpluses reported by the provincial treasurer as evidence of economic management by his government.

Mr. Houde has laid down a program of greater help for the unemployed and has criticized Mr. Taschereau for not taking the full

ness of the struggle and the good weather conditions have caused meetings to be largely attended from the commencement. While in the earlier stages there were many hard knocks delivered, no ill feeling developed until Nomination Day. However, at the post nomination meetings in four places serious disturbances took place. At St. Pascal in Kamouraska County, three men were shot in the legs by an officer during a fracas, while free fights broke out in Montmorency, Gaspe South and St. Rosin Laval County.

Conservative candidates include a number of mayors of municipalities, while the Liberal members of the last House compose the majority of their standard bearers. Carrying on the family tradition in politics Robert Taschereau, son of the Premier, is seeking re-election in Bellechasse, while Paul Sauve son of the former leader of the opposition, is again running in Two Mountains. Dr. Gaspard Fauteux one of Mr. Houde's opponents in St. Mary, is a grandson of Hon. Honore Mercier, Liberal Premier from 1887 to 1890, while J. R. Tellier, son of a former provincial Conservative leader, Mr. Justice Tellier, is opposition candidate in Joliette.
