NOBLE OFFER

This journal has been so long and earnestly engaged in the advocacy of a public library for Charlottetown that it is now with the greatest pleasure we are able to acquaint our readers with the facts stated below.

A short time since the Executive of the Young Men's Christian Association were waited upon by a prominent and worthy citizen who informed them that another citizen, whose name he was not at liberty to disclose had expressed his desire to donate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars toward the establishment of a public library in this city, and that in pursuance of that object he was desirous of acquiring the Y. M. C. A. building for the use of the library. The immediate object of the communication was to learn whether the building could be purchased for that use, and if so at what price.

The Executive of the Y. M. C. A. at a meeting held yesterday afternoon are understood to have taken a favorable view of the proposal made to them and reached a decision both as to the sale for the object named and the price to be set upon the building. Their action is, of course, subject to the approval or rejection of the entire membership of the Association at a general meeting, which meeting will be held on Tuesday evening, January 16th.

The proposal made by the unknown benefactor of the city is a noble and generous one. The sum proposed to be given is munificent in its proportions, and worthy of the noble object for which it is to be given. It should be sufficient to procure a library building and a comprehensive catalogue of books, to which can be added other donations hereafter. All honor to the Unknown, who will be his own executor in bestowing upon his fellow citizens so great a public benefit, and supplying a great and long-felt want.

It is announced that the first public school in Dawson has been opened. The school house was erected by the R. C. Church authorities on church ground and the school will be taught by one of the church sisterhood. There are said to be only about 50 children in Dawson of school age. It is stated that the teaching will be non-sectarian.

Dawson City when last heard from was grappling with the question of keeping the water supply system open during the winter. The water, as in our own system, comes from a well. This well is warmed with steam pipes. The water mains are all packed in sawdust. Each hydrant is covered with a small house with a stove in it, and the water is kept constantly running.

It now transpires that the seizure by Great Britain of American flour shipped to Delagoa Bay is fully covered by an article of an old treaty between the London and Washington Governments. The treaty admits the right of seizure of flour and provisions under conditions such as now exist, but declares they shall not be confiscated but paid for. This, as the Chicago Tribune points out, will no doubt be done, and it adds: "There is no need of discussing whether or not the goods were contraband of war in the present instance. Neither is there any cause for ill feeling."

According to the Winnipeg Free Press there are 63,849 names on the voters lists of Manitoba. Of these in the recent election 47,014 voted. The straight Government candidates received 23,278 votes and the straight Opposition candidates received 23,135 votes. Of the four independent candidates two were personally Conservative and two Liberal. The four received 601 votes, of which the Independent Conservatives had a majority of 27, from which the Free Press concludes that the Liberals had a popular majority of 116 over the whole Province. There is, however, no doubt that Hugh John and his followers have a majority of the seats in the Legislature.

Poison Found in Potatoes.

The Sanitary Home is authority for the statement that potatoes contain a poison known as solanin. New potatoes contain comparatively little of this poison unless they grow above the surface of the ground and have a green skin, when they are generally known to be poisonous.

It is not, however, generally known that old potatoes contain much more of this poisonous principle—solanin—and many cases of serious poisoning have occurred in late summer when old potatoes are used. In 1892 and 1893 there was almost wholesale poisoning among the troops of the German army. The symptoms were frontal headache, colic, diarrhoea, vomiting, weakness, and slight stupor, and in some cases dilatation of the pupils of the eyes. Meyer investigated the case and found in old potatoes, kept in a damp place and beginning to sprout, twenty-four times as much solanin as in new potatoes.—New York Herald.

In Her 108th Year.

Probably the oldest person in the Lower Provinces who has lived to see the closing year of the nineteenth century ushered in is Mrs. Amy Blizzard, of McDonald's Point, who is now in her 108th year. Mrs. Blizzard, who was born in 1792, was the daughter of Mr. Albert Akersley, of New York. In 1811, she married Mr. Thomas Blizzard, of Cambridge, Queen's county. She has nine children, sixty-seven grandchildren and one hundred and ten great-grand children living. She is still in possession of her faculties, the only sign of her great age being a slight deafness.
