THE Guardian is pleased to note the success of G. Roy Long, son of Dr. Long, Tyne Valley, at the recent examinations in Arts at Mount Allison University, Sackville. He led the sophomore class, winning the English prize, consisting of a set of 40 volumes of the Temple Edition of Shakespeare. He also won the Tyler Scholarship, of \$40 for Mathematics and Science.

THE Guardian is pleased to note that Fred M. Auld of Corehead has won the Coster Memorial Prize at McGill University. This prize of \$25 is awarded annually to that student from the Maritime Provinces, who passes the most satisfactory examination in Arts. It is pleasing to note that this prize has for the past three years been awarded to an Island student.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. S. Nicholson, Eldon, took place on Wednesday last, Rev. A. S. Stewart, Wood Islands, officiating in the absence of Rev. Mr. Sinclair. There was a large attendance and interment was made at Belfast cemetery. The deceased was a native of Glasgow, Scotland and one of the oldest residents of Eldon. She and her husband were the first to open a store in Eldon and they also conducted a hotel business in that village for over fifty years. The late Mr. Nicholson died in 1864 and his widow has for the last thirty years been residing alone near Eldon.

DESABLE NUGGETS.—Our fishermen report lobsters to be quite plentiful this season.—Miss Jeannine McNevin returned home from Boston a few days ago and is very favorably impressed with that portion of Uncle Sam's domain, in which she sojourned.—Our much esteemed and enterprising friend E. MacDougall intends opening up a grocery store in the near future and in addition will fit up an ice cream parlor for the summer months. He will certainly have the good wishes of all in his enterprise.—Charles MacQuarrie possesses one of the finest specimens of the equine race ever seen in this section, for some time.—Arnhald Campbell is at present engaged in erecting a large bay window to H. Thomas' dwelling house. It is of a beautiful design and when completed will undoubtedly be another standing monument to his fame as a workman.—Rod McKinnon landed a trout weighing three pounds at Palmer's bridge, Nect.

EASTERN NOTES.—Farmers are getting in the bulk of their crop this week, the odds and ends will come later. There appears to be a good body of cod-fish round the shores yet, but bait has grown scarce. Herring, of which there was an immense body all the spring, has almost entirely disappeared. A few mackerel were caught in the herring nets off Basin Head and Red Point on the night of the 2nd. This is a week later than their arrival last year. These valuable fish, once so important a factor to the income of our fishermen and merchants, appear to be gradually recovering from their almost annihilation by the purse seine from the early eighties up, and if some judicious legislation were finally enacted by the American and Dominion Governments for the regulation of the catch, or the mode of catching, they might be indefinitely preserved, as one of our unfeeling resources. At the present time a number of Gloucester seiners are operating on what they call the Cape Shore, from Cape Sable to Canso, outside the three mile limit certainly, when no cutters are in sight. Their success or non-success materially affects the catches in the Gulf.—John J. Smith has again arrived in our midst to take charge of the Red Point Cheese factory. He has had charge of it since its erection and given the best of satisfaction. He is always heartily welcomed by the boys, and good citizens generally.—The supply of milk is not promising for any of this eastern section, as the long cold winter told seriously on the cattle.

THE SAD DEATH OF A YOUNG MAN

Fred. Love, Son of Edward Love Suicides

While in a Fit of Despondency He Drowns Himself in a Pit at the Tannery.

The body of Fred Love, 30 years old, son of Edward Love, St. Peter's Road, was found about eight o'clock yesterday morning in the pit of his father's tannery where he had suicided while in a fit of mental aberration. The boy who was despondent for some time had worked in the tannery during the previous day as usual. After tea he went out of the house with his working clothes on as usual. He did not reappear and it was thought he had come into town. Search was later made and yesterday morning his body was found. He had gone to the tannery, entered by a hatchway and after removing some boards from the top of the pit and tying some weights around his neck let himself down through the opening. When found he was quite stiff and it is thought he must have suicided immediately after tea. The family will have the deep sympathy of many in their trying bereavement.

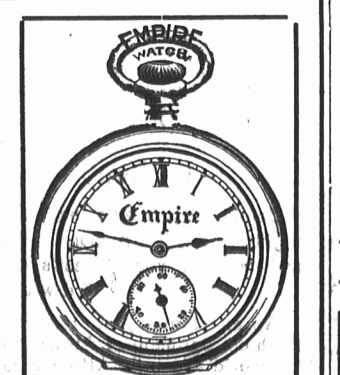
