NEW GLASGOW.
DEAR SIR.—Having been a visitor to this island for the past two months, and being a regular reader of your paper The Guardian I have noticed a number of letters from different writers telling about the beauties of the island but failed to say one word about the most beautiful part.
Having travelled from Charlottetown to the extreme end of the island west, I failed to see one place to equal New Glasgow and surroundings. On arriving at Hunter River you proceed by the Hunter River road to Rustico.
On taking this drive, will see many beautiful farms both to right and left. One of the most beautiful scenes is on and about the Old Proctor estate now owned by John Murphy, formerly of Stanley Bridge. Of this scene a number of souvenir postal cards have been printed. One wishing for scenery should visit here. Rising in the morning one of the first things to attract your attention is the Clyde River, better known as the Glasgow River, with its curves and bends as far as the eye can see alluring one to Rustico with its pleasant beaches and fishing industries.
You may proceed through Cavendish and Hope River to Stanley Bridge, which is one of the most attractive villages in that vicinity with its numerous churches and stores, also the largest and most prosperous cheese factory on the island.
