HASLAM BROS of Victoria are rafting a large amount of lumber from De Sable River for their sash and door factory at Victoria.

THE Schr. W. Dunbar arrived in port on Saturday evening with a cargo of lumber for Jas. Barrett. She will discharge to-day at Connolly's Wharf.

LOBSTER fishing is reported to have been unusually good on the Nova Scotia coast. One firm on Pictou Island have already put up nearly 500 cases.

J. R. LAMY, yesterday, sold, to parties in Pictou his handsome bay trotting gelding, Johnnie Kirkope, sired by Edgardo, 2.13 1/2, dam Daisy Hartsborn, 2.24. He comes off good stock and will make a mark for himself.—Amherst Press.

In referring to the arrival of the S. S. Halifax in Hawkesbury the Bulletin says: Capt. Pye's many friends here were pleased to see him looking so well. He docked his ship in his usual seamanship manner so pleasing even to those having no knowledge of navigation.

DR. E. W. GAHAN, of Boston, will leave that port July 7th or 8th for Digby via Yarmouth in his new 25 footer to take part in the Interprovincial yacht race off Digby. Dr. Gahan is a native of Charlottetown. With his family he has passed the last two summers at Digby.

MR. S. F. HODGSON returned Saturday evening from Ottawa. Mr. Byrne the other delegate stopped off at St. John to visit his daughter. We are given to understand that the new system of insurance for the Railway employees will be inaugurated 1st July next.

THE Shorthorn bull purchased by the Port Hawkesbury and Point Tupper Agricultural Society, arrived here from Charlottetown last Saturday. He is a young animal, dark red in color, and while beefy belongs to the milking strain. He is of excellent breeding, and is registered in the Dominion Shorthorn Herd Book.—Hawkesbury Bulletin.

THE Pictou Standard says: P. E. Islanders have been agitating for direct steamship communication with England. On Wednesday Hon. Mr. Fisher announced in the House of Commons that the steamer that it was proposed should run on this route was the Miacma. This steamer, owned by J. W. Carmichael & Co. New Glasgow, and commanded by Capt. Richard Meikle, is now loading lumber at Pictou Landing, for Glasgow.

SIR LOUIS DAVIES said a change of policy had been made in regard to caring for sailors, and that marine hospitals were being done away with where there were good general hospitals. Sailors were treated in these hospitals and paid for out of the marine hospital fund. He said it was proposed to spend \$5,000 on a new hospital at Louisburg, \$5,000 on a new wing at Sydney, and \$2,000 on repairs at Pictou.

MR. E. J. DUFFY came to the city from Souris Saturday afternoon. He reports the work progressing on the new R. C. Church in that place in a very satisfactory manner. To-day he will go to Mt. Carmel to place in position the new pedestal and statue of the Virgin and Infant Redeemer which is to be erected in front of the new brick and stone church at Mount Carmel, Fifteen Point.

If the new magistrate is not appointed they will doubtless be given their freedom.

The design has been prepared by Hamilton McCarthy, of Ottawa, a well-known Canadian sculptor, who has also undertaken the contract for the completion and erection of the memorial. The corner stone is to be laid by the Duke of York on his projected visit to Halifax.

Stipendiary Hazard did not take his seat upon the bench and as a consequence Henry got clear while his "brother" more unfortunate, possibly, than he, had some money when incarcerated on Friday evening and the Marshal told him that he would keep the money until Monday.
