Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may, by erecting a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duplicates—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the locality. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Free-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivation 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. The Duty of the Hour

tion here, it is not so. I have travelled through this country, and wherever there was a meeting called to give expression to loyalty and trust, and faith and sacrifice and service, that spirit I found there! I will tell you what I do not like. I took a beautiful trip last summer with a friend who took me from Montreal to Boston and then to New York, in an auto, spending nearly a week on the road, going through all their beautiful towns and villages, and I noticed the American flag flying from nearly every home. I travel this country and do not see our ensign lying to the breeze from every home,—where it ought to be. (Applause.) "Home-land, sea-land, home of the free-land."

"Faithful thy children wherever they be; One in thy motherhood, one in our brotherhood, One in devotion undying to thee."

It would help our children to sing that sweet song, say if they had the flag flying at the school house, and if we had it flying from our own homes it would remind us of what the flag stands for.

I dislike this thought of "Safety First" and "Canada First." Maybe I am wrong, but I dislike it. It is not safety first and it is not Canada first, but it is Empire First (Applause.) for we owe it to the glorious freedom we have in this little corner of the Empire. It is Empire first! always first! You know the history of the olden days, when Hamilton fought for federation and a nation with the little men "who mistook the murmur of this burg for the great wave that winds round the Globe," and who wanted a greater New York. Hamilton won. And again later in America's history when Horace Greely wanted peace! peace! "Let the erring brother go in peace," said he, but Lincoln won for Union. We want that spirit in us, for with unity comes great strength, and that we will never get unless we strive for it. Breed up in Canada a sentiment of loyalty to the Empire and we will be worthy sons.

The thought occurred to me that possibly in the matter of our voluntary effort in food control we were not quite as we ought to be in the country districts. It may possibly be true that in sections of the province where they have never felt want and need, they rather laugh at the idea of conservation of food. It may be that there are some few selfish souls in this country who never think they can do anything voluntarily, but must be driven by the long arm of the law; and they wait for the law and the statute and the bye-law. There are some of that class, but I do not think they are many. Looking around this town, I see the yards the ladies so kindly distributed, exhibited in most houses. Most of our people look on that as a religious duty—if I may make a duty more strikingly observable by adding the word "religious," I would propose that in the country districts a word of appeal might be sent them that they take

the idea of General Mewburn to heart when he said, "I want one army, not one in Canada, one in England and one in France." What did he mean? He wanted everybody to be enrolled in service of some kind. He wanted everybody to be in close connection with the soldier boy at the front. He wanted everybody to feel that they had a sense of responsibility on him and her either to save the mouthful of bacon or to use other than wheat flour, or to save the beef; that they were all in the same service. That is the thought. It is easy to send it broadcast in the country, because when you go there, you find a great welcome and a great heartiness in giving. You find no holding back, and there would be no holding back if they once thought they were doing a real service. The Psalmist—and he was a real soldier, too—said "Our God shall come, and he shall not keep silence. He shall call to the heavens above and the earth beneath. Gather my saints together unto me, those that have made a covenant with me by sacrifice."

The covenant we have to make today is a covenant that we will be on the side of those who are fighting for everything that is sacred to humanity, against the most degraded, slavish serfdom ever sought to be imposed on the peoples of the earth, a great force of malignant evil. If we realize that that is the covenant for every British-born, Empire-born freeman, what matters else? The opinion of the world, said President Wilson, is the "power of the world," and the power of the world is based up on the individual sacrifice of every living soul in it. What can we do in this conflict against brutal might? That is the call to us, and to those who hear the call, and keep the covenant. Might I not quote the poet who said:

Glory be to man on high, with his face turned to the light; Human love his majesty, human wisdom for his might. Love and reverence, duty and service—let that ring out, and God will bless our little land. We have no troubles with our conscription; we have no conflict in our Judiciary; we have no gatherings together in woods to defy the military powers; and we are loyally holding up the Flag. Our boys are keeping the covenant, and paying the full toll, and to them I dedicate this monument—no more fitting one I know of:

Monument Enough Where I shall fall upon my battle-ground There may I rest—nor carry me away;

What holier hills could in these days be found Than hills of France to hold a soldier's clay? Nor need ye place a cross of wooden stuff Over my head to mark my age and name; This very ground is monument enough! 'Tis all I wish of show or outward fame. Deep in the hearts of fellow-countrymen My fast immortal sepulcher shall be, Greater than all the tombs of ancient kings, What matter where my dust shall scatter then? I shall have served my country overseas And loved her—dying with a heart that sings.
