Canadian Assets Pivotal New York Stocks

Globe & Rutgers Exceed Liabilities

Canadian assets of the Globe and Rutgers Insurance Company are substantially in excess of its liabilities. Canadian policyholders, according to a statement issued by the Department of Insurance at Ottawa. The statement reads: "The Department of Insurance here has been advised by the Superintendent of Insurance for New York that by order of the court, with the consent of the board of directors of the Globe and Rutgers Insurance Company, he has taken possession of that company for the purpose of reorganization, if possible, and conservation of its assets. Under the provisions of the Insurance Act of Canada applicable to that company, a deposit is required to be maintained with the Minister of Finance to protect Canadian policyholders and at the present time this deposit, taken at current market value, is substantially in excess of the full unearned premiums, outstanding losses and other liabilities on its Canadian business. This deposit is held primarily for the protection of Canadian policyholders exclusively and until their policies are protected, do not form part of the general assets of the company available for policyholders outside of Canada."

LIVESTOCK

MONTEAL, April 4.—There were 111 cattle, 21 sheep, 1,943 calves and 1,254 hogs for sale on the Montreal stock market, including about 1,100 hogs held over from yesterday. Quotations followed for the week to date 147 cattle—75 of which were to be loaded at Saint John from Woodstock, N. B. The balance were 621 from Montreal, 372 from the Concordia and 289 for the Salacia all booked to leave Saint John and Halifax this week. There were three loads of western cattle just arrived and these are to be rested and fed before being offered for sale. With a heavy offering and quality being common to just fair, sales were slow, and prices were just steady to 25 cents lower in most. Fair to medium quality calves brought \$3.20 with just fair kinds around \$2.25 and some of the best from \$2.75 to \$3.00. Common drinkers were from \$2 to \$2.25. Spring lambs of good weight and quality brought \$1 each, with lighter ones hard to sell, some making \$1 each. A couple of loads of good hogs were sold for \$19 to \$23, the balance of the hogs were still unsold.

MONTEAL, April 4.—Light trading prevailed on the Montreal produce and dairy market today. Cattle and sheep were low levels established in the market yesterday although a better tone was experienced. Fresh graded extras were quoted at 16 to 18 1/2 cents, firsts at 14 1/2 to 15 cents and seconds at 13 1/2 to 14 cents a dozen. Receipts totaled 2,400 head. Butter sold at the full range of 24 to 24 1/2 cents a pound for carlots or less of no 1 standard or fresh Western make. Fresh local butter was quoted at 23 1/2 cents a pound. Arrivals were 1,081 boxes. Cheese was firm at 10 1/2 to 11 cents a pound for current Ontario coltado. Receipts were 33 boxes. Potatoes were unchanged. DEEPER LAYING PENS FAVOURED

A poultry house 20 by 20 feet is regarded as about the correct size for one hundred laying hens. A house of this size used at the federal Experimental Station, Harrow, Ont., is proving satisfactory. Birds in a smaller house, 16 by 18 feet, appeared to be more uncomfortable during the winter months. This condition, as stated by the Superintendent, was borne out by the behaviour of the birds in the smaller house for they would seek shelter from the draught and huddle in corners. An outbreak of colds and roup confirmed this condition, as no trouble of this nature was experienced in the larger house. A careful record of the variation in temperature of the two houses showed comparatively little difference. This uncomfortable condition was believed to be due to draught created in the narrower house.

ment that the interests of all the teachers be safeguarded before any superannuation payments are made. Discussion as to the proper pensionable age for female teachers followed by Mr. McIntyre, Mr. LePage, Mr. Allen, Mr. T. A. Campbell, Mr. Strong and others. Teachers' Pensions On motion of Hon. Dr. MacMillan the House went into committee on the second reading of an Act to amend the Teachers' Superannuation Act, 1931. The promoter explained the purpose of the amendments, which is to make the Act fairer to the rank and file of the teaching profession. The amendments provide that the sum to be paid by the Provincial Treasurer into the fund shall be equal to one-half the amount contributed by the teachers; that persons making application previous to July 1, 1941, shall (unless disabled) have reached the full age of 60 years; that superannuation shall be granted only when sanctioned by the Lieutenant Governor in Council; as well as amendments governing years of service. Teachers' contributions run to about \$10,000 or \$12,000 annually under the Act, the promoter explained. The Government had been assured that the plan would be workable with the amendments proposed. If, however, the amendments are not acceptable to the teachers they will not be put into effect. The teachers have signified their desire of having the Act rechecked every five years. There are several teachers who are now asking for pensions under the Act, and it is the desire of the Government that the fees or
