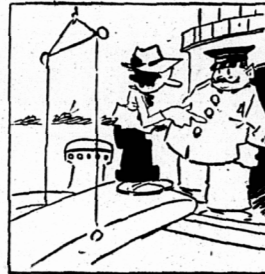

### ENGLISH AND AMERICAN GIRLS IN NIGHT RAIDS

(British United Press)  
LONDON, Oct. 30. —Girls bearing well-known English and American names were among the 1,200 persons arrested in recent raid by the Paris "police of morals" on dens of hideous vice.

The most amazing feature of this raid, the biggest yet made by the Paris police on the city's dens of vice, was the revelation that Britain is honey-combed by an agency which supplies men and women of depraved tastes with addresses at which they can indulge their depravity.

Among documents seized were names and addresses of agent of traffic in drugs and obscene prints and books, as well as a register of person all over England interested in visiting dens of infamy such as there are in Paris.

These names and addresses included those of many pupils at famous English public schools, and it is obvious that there is an agency catering for persons of depraved tastes of both sexes. There is hardly a town in the British Isles that does not appear to have its agents.

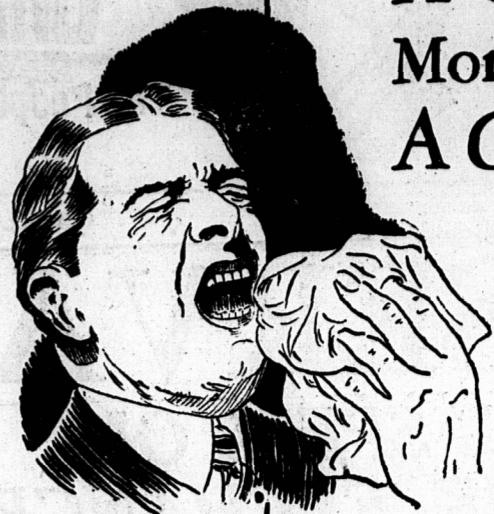
Two of the dens raided were given over to "pose plastiques" and three were devoted to dope orgies, but the majority were secret cinemas of the worst description.
