Mr. Paul Kollins Proves Himself a Monologist of Rare Entertaining Ability and a Master of Comedy, Tragedy and Pathos.

What, without doubt, was the finest evening's entertainment ever given to a local audience, was that which Mr. Paul Kollins, noted monologist, presented to a pleased and appreciative audience at St. Peter's Hall last night.

The programme consisted of the Scottish poem "James Douglas," "The Bell," a comic poem, "The Latest Way of Cooking," a tableau-verse of the trial scene in "The Merchant of Venice," "The Roses," the oration of Spartacus to his twelve companions in captivity; the impersonation of the Chinese foster father of Ming Tai in "East is West"; the poem by James Whitcomb Riley "An Old Sweetheart of Mine"; "The Cremation of Sam McGee" (Robert Service); a dramatic scene from Sir Wm. Irving's play "The Belshazzar Feast"; the impersonation of the Rev. Gilcrest from the play "The Fool"; "The Reckoning" (Robert Service); Mark Antony's funeral oration over the body of Caesar (Shakespeare) the poem "Would You."

The programme was splendidly balanced as to drama, tragedy and comedy and was instructive and educational. Mr. H. H. McArthur of Halifax arrived on the Borden train yesterday morning to make the final arrangements in the showing of the Phonofilm which will be produced in the Prince Edward Theatre four days commencing tomorrow.
