PARTICULARS of the death of Mr. Alex G. Rankin, Perth Amboy, are to hand. Mr Rankin was working at the Perth Amboy dry docks on the morning of his death. He held the position of dock master superintending the docking of vessels. A schooner was being hauled up and Mr. Rankin was placing the kneel blocks. In order to move the blocks quickly he took a hitch with a rope around a revolving shaft, which runs the length of the dock. It is supposed that his clothes were caught between the shaft and rope. Mr. Rankin was whirled around, his head striking repeatedly the timbers. The engine was stopped as quickly as possible, but the injured man died half an hour later in the doctor's hands. He leaves a wife but no children. He has three brothers in Perth Amboy and a sister, Mrs. John Williams, in Charlottetown.

ROBERTS WELCOMED HOME

The Queen Commands For Him An Arch of Laurel Royalties Present

HE IS CREATED AN EARL AND GARTER KNIGHT

Kruger Confined to Bed With Bronchitis—Vancouver's Welcome to the Returning Brave—Officers Going to Halifax to Meet the Rosslyn Castle—Gold Watches Presented—A Petition Against Father O'Leary Spoken Of.

LORD ROBERTS' HEARTY WELCOME.

COWES, Jan. 2.—(Special)—The S. S. Canada with Lord Roberts aboard anchored off Osborne at 11.45 this morning.

Lord Roberts was given a warm welcome. One declaration was an arch of laurel, a tribute paid by the Queen's orders and the first tribute of the kind Her Majesty ever paid to a subject.

The Princess Beatrice and the Duke of Connaught met Lord Roberts, whose arm is still in a sling.

HE IS CREATED AN EARL.

At the Palace the Queen conferred an Earldom on him, and also created him a Knight of the Garter.

The Earldom carried with it a remainder to his daughter during her lifetime.

The death of Lord Roberts' only son in South Africa prevents the title becoming hereditary in a fuller sense.

The vacant Garter to which Lord

Roberts succeeds was held by the Duke of Argyll.

VANCOUVER WELCOMES HER SOLDIERS.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—(Special)—Vancouver warmly welcomed home her soldiers with demonstrations of great enthusiasm.

Each member was presented with a gold watch and other souvenirs.

On Christmas eve the Rev. P. D. McGougan, who acted as assistant to Rev. Mgr. Macdonald, at St. Andrews, was presented with an address and a snug sum of money.

THE Abegweit and Victoria Hockey teams have ordered from Harold A. Wilson & Co., Toronto, a set of goal nets. It is expected that the nets will prevent the usual disputes which arise especially in close work.

YESTERDAY the four-year-old child of Mr. Cantwell of the Mechanical Department of the railway, received severe burning, while placing paper in the stove, the flames igniting the little ones clothes. Owing to the presence of mind of Mrs. Cantwell in smothering the flames with a mat a more serious accident was averted.

LAST night Mr. Cumming, of the Gem Studio, exhibited the 450 candle power gasolene lamp in Mr. J. T. McKenzie's show window. The light and burner resembles the ordinary auer light and burner and should be a delightful light for churches throughout the country districts. Two lights will easily light a building holding 200 to 300 people. The burning is perfectly noiseless and the white light is a very great improvement over the ordinary kerosene.

THE Halifax Herald in referring to the markets of that city says:—The high price of butter is a prime feature of the Halifax produce market. Canadian dairy rolls are wholesaling at 21c; there is practically no Nova Scotia dairy and Nova Scotia tubs wholesale at 24c. Cheese took milk that otherwise would have gone into butter in this province and it is estimated that 10,000 more boxes of cheese were made this season than last. The outlook for butter seems to be still higher prices. The cry everywhere is no milk. The factories are closing. One reason for this scarcity of milk is the high prices of feed and farmers decline to feed their stock up to a good milking standard. Speaking of cheese, a Halifax dealer states that the western make is much higher than usual, but that it is all fall make. He says that in Montreal there are 350,000 boxes, all in the hands of five or six firms who can hold in the hope of higher prices. Consumption will regulate the price but these capitalists seem to think the chances favor a raise and they are holding. Dealers report hay firm with an upward tendency and a good demand. Oats are quiet with no quotable change in price and not many arriving from P. E. Island.
