MR. HECTOR'S VINDICATION.

At the meeting in the Opera House last night Rev. J. H. Hector did credit to himself and the cause he represents. He opened his case by reading the Mayor of Eureka's reply to A. J. B. Mellish of this city. According to his reply the Mayor says at least three things: First, that Mr. Hector was never in Eureka; second that his experience as related is absolutely without foundation and third that in his relation to the public, Mr. Hector is only playing the part of an impostor.

In dealing with the first of these charges, Mr. Hector told of his going to Eureka. He was sent there by the Executive Committee of the State Prohibition Convention. They had arranged for meetings throughout the State of South Dakota and Mr. Hector was laid off for work in the office of the State where Eureka is found. A letter was read from Ralph L. Brown, a lawyer of Aberdeen, South Dakota, showing that he was a member of the Executive Committee; that he distinctly remembers Rev. J. H. Hector, and says positively that the "Black Knight" spoke in Eureka and in many other sections of the State. Mr. Bushnell, the chairman of the Committee is dead, but his wife sent a letter stating that Mr. Hector did good work. A. G. Wolfenberger, an attorney of Lincoln, Nebraska, says that any one who knows anything about the campaign knows that John H. Hector was at Eureka. Wolfenberger labored their some time after Mr. Hector held his meetings. About the time that Mr. Hector was there Wolfenberger and others undertook to put up a tent, but they were threatened and had to move on to other places. S. H. Cranmer the State Attorney of South Dakota remembers very well the circumstances of Hector's address at Eureka.

The Mayor of Eureka says, secondly that Mr. Hector's experience is absolutely without foundation. Letters were read last night proving beyond any question that Mr. Hector was there and that he held a meeting there. These letters set forth the fact that he not only held a meeting there but that he was threatened with violence and death if he attempted to hold a prohibition meeting. The letters further show the meeting was conducted in the face of the greatest difficulty. Mr. Cranmer states positively that a number of Mr. Hector's comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic protested him in the Eureka meeting. All the letters go to show that Eureka was an exceedingly tough place in those days. Thus far the Black Knight makes out an excellent case, and proves beyond doubt that his experience had foundation in fact.

Turning to the third point of the Mayor of Eureka's letter, Mr. Hector stated, that His Worship the Mayor, had seen fit to stamp the whole story as "absolutely untrue." In this way, said the Knight, he would make me out to be a rank impostor. Mr. Hector had already shown that the Mayor of Eureka did not know what he was talking about, for some of the most reliable men in the United States today have made Hector's position good by the letters they have written. And so to offset the Mayor's statement relative to the Black Knight's position before the public, Mr. Hector had a large number of letters read from leading people

on both sides of the Atlantic. Among these letters are most excellent ones from several Bishops of the Church to which Mr. Hector belongs, editors of newspapers and the Regents of Livingston College, S. C., who sent Mr. Hector to England in 1890 to solicit funds. Through certain correspondence with the Dominion Alliance by people in this city, Mr. Hector's relation to the Grand Army is called in question. In reply he produced his last cheque received from the Pension Office in Washington. His experience in Virginia was called in question also. In answer he showed the audience a gold medal he received in Norfolk, Va., because of what he had done there. Letters were also read from Sir Wilfred Lawson of England, together with letters from a number of other persons in England.

Mr. Hector, however, kept the good wine until the last. The letters he submitted to the audience and that he received from Frances Willard of precious memory put John H. Hector entirely above suspicion. The letter from Frances Willard to Lady Henry Somerset expresses her confidence in Hector and her hearty admiration for the noble work he is doing for God and humanity. She says among other things: "Brother Hector has worked to excellent acceptance throughout the United States and Canada. He is a converted man, an earnest Christian, a successful minister of the Gospel of Christ, and one of the most effective advocates of prohibition and moral reform. I feel confident that he will sustain himself ably in the trip to England which he now contemplates and I am sure you will be glad to speak a good word for him so that he may get a start after which, he will be abundantly able to make his own way."

Mr. Hector's vindication appears to be full and complete, and we believe a fair-minded community will accept it as a sufficient answer to the calumnies and aspersions to which he has been subjected.

THE WINTER STEAMERS.

The effort of the Minto to rescue the Stanley has resulted disastrously, the Minto having broken all the blades of her propeller. She is now powerless to help either herself or the Stanley, and the latter still fast in the ice. The two disabled steamers are reported half a mile apart somewhere off Cape George. Thus matters have gone from bad to worse and the prospects for freight traffic for weeks to come might look dark indeed were it not for certain facts. We understand that the Minto has a spare propeller on board, and another at Pictou. It may be that the propeller can be replaced by the engineer and crew, or that the services of a diver will be required, in order to assist in placing it in position and if such should be the case not a moment should be lost in getting one on the spot.

We greatly regret to record the death of Rev. Adam Gunn, which was announced yesterday by telegram from Estevan, Assiniboia. Recently relieved of his charge in Carlgan where he had ministered eleven years, the Rev. gentleman had some months ago accepted a call to Estevan. The people of Carlgan, together with those among whom his earlier labors in Nova Scotia were spent, will join with his ministerial brethren in deep regret for his demise. Mr. Gunn was born in Nova Scotia about 55 years ago. A widow and four daughters survive, and will have the sincere sympathy of a wide circle. They had intended joining the husband and father in the Northwest next spring, but the sad occurrence renders a meeting on earth impossible. The Guardian tenders heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved ones.

BOUGHT BY BRITAIN.

Rome, Feb. 30.—The Argentine minister states that Great Britain has purchased the cruisers Rivadavia and Moreno, which are now under construction at Genoa for Argentina. It is reported that Great Britain has also purchased the warships Constitution and Libertad, which Armstrong, Vickers & Company are building for Chile.
