FISHERMEN END STRIKE
VANCOUVER, Oct. 3 — (CP) — The week-long strike of 4,500 British Columbia fishermen ended today. At Sunday meetings along the coast, the fishermen, members of the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union, accepted the latest packers' price offers for chum salmon. Operators will pay nine cents a pound for chum caught in Johnstone Strait and a market-fluctuating price of seven cents in other areas. Fishermen originally demanded 10 1/2 and eight cents, respectively.
