Track Notes

Mr. Frank Boutlier, Halifax, who is domiciled at the Charlottetown Driving Park, is very much pleased with his Island surroundings. Mr. Boutlier has been training horses for Messrs. J. A. Leaman & Co. for thirty years. As a young lad he took the eye of Mr. Leaman (well know to the old followers of racing in this Province as one of the finest sportsmen connected with the game) and his first race was as a boy of sixteen. In it he scored a victory with a horse which was considerably better than much outclassed. In succeeding years he added victory after victory to his list, placing dozens of fine performers in the coveted 230 list. Mr. Boutlier has trained and driven and sold more high class horses than any other trainer in the Maritime Provinces. He is an expert with all kinds of horses, particularly so with colts, and his work at the race track with three 3-year old colts since he came here has elicited warm admiration from local horsemen. Particular mention must be made of Col. J. S. Jenkin's 3-year old trotter which under his expert handling is showing up remarkably well. There are also several other prospects which he is training and developing. It is a distinct gain to the city to have Mr. Boutlier come here, as his presence has given a renewed impetus to horse racing. Every day our track has from ten to twenty horses training over it, and as a visitor remarked the other day, one would not see a much livelier track in any part of North America.

Mr. Peter Conroy, well known local horse trainer, has escorted himself very comfortably at the Charlottetown Driving Park where he is fitting out and handling some splendid speed prospects. Mr. Conroy's fame as a balancer of horses is well known and he has justly earned his high reputation in this respect. This year he has a remarkable speed prospect at his stable named Zua Baughman. This mare is about seven years old and was bred by John S. Baughman of Kentucky, who has bred some of the greatest horses in America. The mare received her first lessons from the great Ed Gears and was subsequently sold to Mr. G. B. Fowick of Sussex, N. S., this year passing into the hands of local parties. It will be remembered that last fall she started in the second division of the 2.25 pace in a field of twelve starters, in which the great Northern Mack was the winner. In the second heat she got of quite a distance behind but rapidly closed the gap and finished close second. She is a mare of high temperament but if she can be controlled, as no doubt she will be by Mr. Conroy, she will be a fancy pacer.

Moncton will hold a two day's racing carnival on July 1st and 2nd. Mr. Belliveau, proprietor, intends to stage six races and he counts on having about forty horses from the Maritime Provinces taking part in them. The Falkner stable of Montreal is also coming down with eight horses—all cracker-jacks. Mr. Belliveau has organized a circuit track, starting at Moncton, continuing to Port Elgin and St. John and then joining the Maritime and main circuit at Fredericton.

It will be learned with regret by all lovers of fast horses that the great Bill Sheron, 2.11 1/4, is confined to his stall through lameness. Bill was a little dinky on one hind leg during his four years racing, and until last season scarcely show

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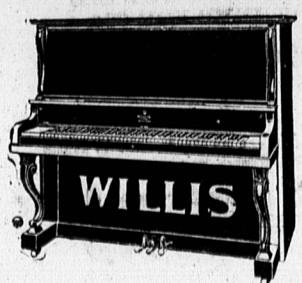

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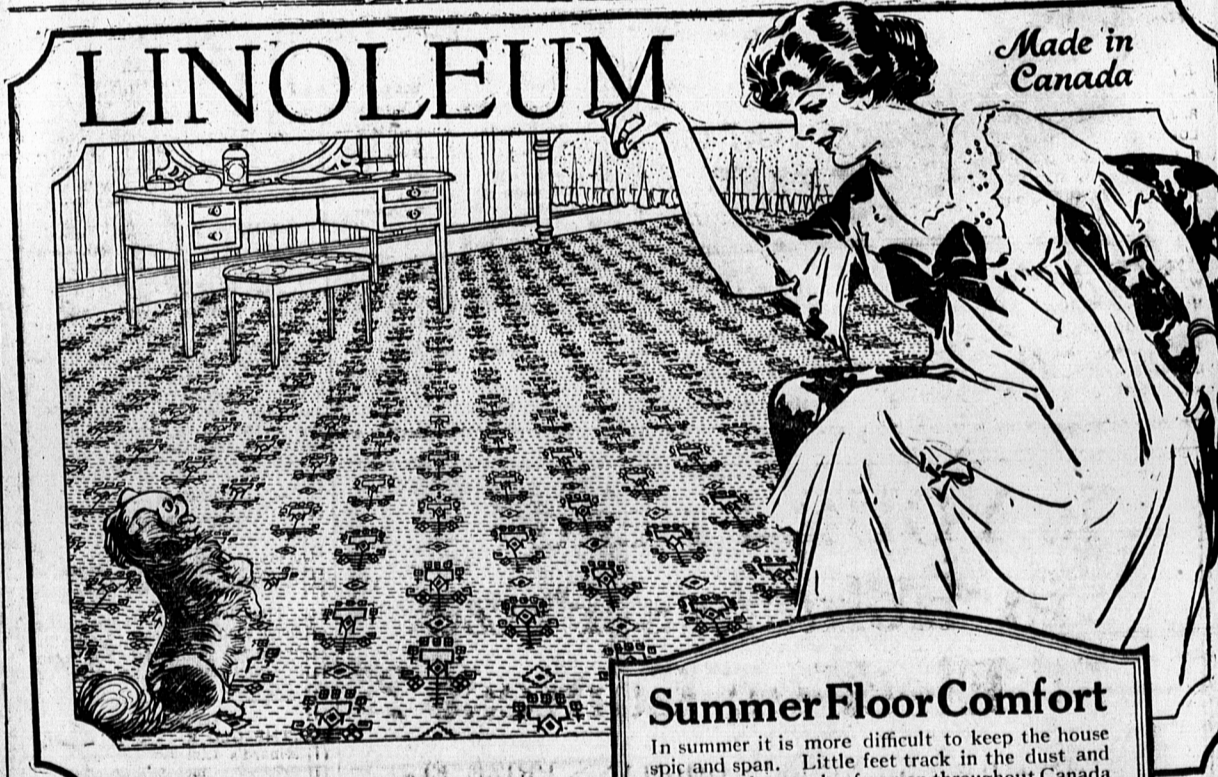
