Nazis Pushed Seven Miles Past Mohzhaisk

(By Robert Magidoff) (Associated Press Staff Writer) MOSCOW, Jan. 22—(Thursday)—(AP)—The exultant Red army early today had rolled the remnants of three more German divisions seven miles beyond recaptured Mohzhaisk, dealing out heavy casualties and intent on giving the enemy not a moment to entrench.

Flanking attacks also were pressed from both north and south of the city. Twenty five settlements were retaken on the north wing alone, in the Kalinin sector.

The battle cry was: "The battle of Moscow is over; the road to full victory lies ahead." The 3rd motor infantry division, the 3rd motor in fantry division, the 3rd motor division, the 321st infantry regiment and the 197th infantry division were being pushed back westward by the victorious Russians, today's communique said.

The Germans are suffering heavy losses, particularly in the south," the bulletin added.

In recapturing Mohzhaisk, holdout bastion of the German advance on Moscow from the west and a point which the Germans had erected their strongest type of fortification, the Russians captured at least 20 guns, 76 mortar vehicles, three warehouses with munitions, and other equipment, according to "the complete preliminary data" given in the communique.

On the southeastern front a series of violent German counterattacks were repulsed with the aid of cavalry and artillery, other dismounts said.

Longest Session Of Parliament Prorogued

Today Members will meet to open new Session.

By C. R. Blackburn Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA, Jan. 1—(CP)—Chief Justice Lyman Duff, Deputy of the Governor-General, today prorogued the second session of Canada's 19th Parliament—the longest session of any Parliament since Confederation.

Prorogation was carried out shortly after 8 p.m. A.S.T. with a brief Throne speech which reviewed the war and Canada's part in it since the session opened Nov. 7, 1940.

Tomorrow the members will again be summoned to the Senate Chamber at 3 p.m. when the Governor-General will read the Throne speech formally opening a new session.

The last day of the record-breaking session was featured by an afternoon sitting of the House of Commons at which Defence Minister Ralston made a statement on Canadian participation in defence of Hong Kong and Prime Minister Mackenzie King promised

to do his utmost to assist in the dispatch of assistance to Hong Kong was no longer a feasible operation of war. Much less was there even a possibility of an attempt to repeat the miracle of Dunkerque.

"The Japanese, by these events, became free to attack by land, sea and air, and the only support could come from the Chinese operating at the rear of the Japanese landward attack. The Chinese, despite all their efforts were not able to influence the outcome of the battle."

"It remained for the British, Canadian and Indian troops making up the garrison of Hong Kong to face the odds and fight it out, as they did."

"Telling the story of Hong Kong, the defence minister said:— "The first indication of action was contained in a telegram, Dec. 8, naming two signalmen, who were wounded in action. On the following day, Dec. 9, a telegram referred to one company of Winnipeg Grenadiers despatched as reinforcements to Kowloon brigade."

"On Dec. 10, information was received that this company was still in reserve and not yet employed. On Dec. 12 a telegram reported that pressure had developed on the left flank at Kowloon, but the situation was stabilized by all available reserves including one company of Winnipeg Grenadiers. 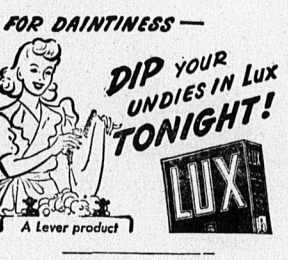

Jap, Thai Invaders strike Hard at Burma

RANGOON, Burma, Jan. 21—(AP)—Burma's air and ground defenders fended off a heavy attack by Japanese and Thai invaders who had struck almost a third of the way across lower Burma toward the Gulf of Martaban.

An intense struggle raged on the mountain slope near Kawrak, 20 miles inside the Burma-Thai border and about 45 miles east of the city of Moulmein, on the tide-swept gulf almost directly opposite Rangoon.

British aircraft were in the battle itself and British bombers with fighter escorts struck hard at Thailand's Rohang airbase east of Moulmein. No British planes were lost.
