Conservative Convention At Tignish

Mr. Clarence F. Morrissey of Tignish and Mr. J. Don Campbell of Alberton were nominated at Tignish last night to contest the First District of Prince for the Progressive Conservative Party at the next Provincial election.

Mr. Morrissey, who represents the district at present in the Provincial Legislature was named unanimously as the assemblyman candidate. His nomination was moved by Pyming Perry of Howland and seconded by Herb Fraser of Alberton.

Mr. Campbell, a merchant, was moved as councillor candidate by Mr. Allison Horne of O'Leary. Mr. Horne earlier had been moved as a candidate but declined the honor. The nomination of Mr. Campbell was seconded by Mr. Hubert Gaudet of Tignish. This is Mr. Campbell's first appearance in politics.

Mr. Morrissey was elected in a by-election when the seat became vacant following the appointment of Hon. J. A. Bernard as Lieutenant Governor of the Province.

Speakers at the convention included in addition to the two candidates, P. M. McCaul, president of the West Prince Conservative Association, Peter Burke, Tignish, Chester McCarthy, Tignish, Sanford Phillips, O'Leary, George Matthews, O'Leary, Gus Peters, Duvar, George Warren, Millroad, Peter Pate, O'Leary, J. 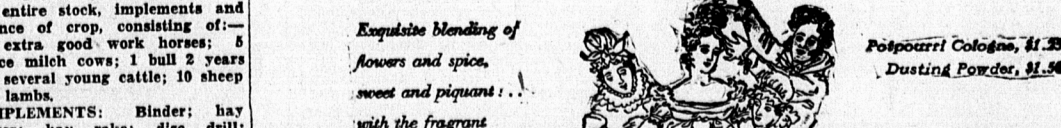
