THE Association Board of the Royal Academy of Music and the Royal College of Music held its theory examination throughout the Dominion on Saturday last, June 2nd. There was a considerable increase in the number of candidates over last year. The examiner, Mr. Stewart Macpherson, a distinguished Professor of the Royal Academy of Music, London, Eng. will arrive at New York on Saturday next and will examine the practical candidates in Charlottetown Monday June 18th. During his stay in the City Mr. Macpherson will be at the Queen Hotel.

On Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, one of the prettiest weddings of the season took place at the home of Mr. John McFadyen of Augustine Cove, when Miss Mary McFadyen only daughter of the late Neil McFadyen was united in marriage to Rev. D. McLean of Lot 48, Rev. John Goodwill performed the ceremony. The bride who was charmingly gowned was given away by her brother Mr. John McFadyen, Miss Sadie Robertson was bridesmaid and the groom was supported by Dr. J. S. Lowther of Summerside. After a sumptuous dinner the happy couple left for Lot 48 followed by the best wishes of those who had assembled to witness the ceremony.

OBITUARY.—Died at Glen William Lot 63 on the 2nd day of May 1900 of internal cancer, Archibald Nicholson aged 80 years. Deceased was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland and in early life emigrated to P. E. Island and located at Glen William to begin as one of the pioneers to clear the primeval forest for a homestead. Perseveringly he surmounted the many difficulties and hardships necessarily endured and he acquired a fair competency for himself and family. He was in full communion with the Presbyterian Church at Caledonia. Of stern integrity, he was unassuming and inoffensive, a kind husband, loving father and respected by all who had the pleasure of his association. A widow and four daughters survive him to mourn their irreparable loss, viz: Mrs. James E. Collins of Glen William; Mrs. Levert J. Acorn, Alliston; Mrs. Joseph Ammon Weatherbie, who resides in Boston, and Miss Christina, who is at home. To him death had no terror, but came as a messenger of peace. He died trusting in the resurrection and a glorious immortality through the merits of his Blessed Redeemer.

The frog industry has reached considerable dimensions in the United States. Less than a quarter of a century ago only a few people ate frogs, but now so we are told by The Chicago Live Stock Journal, nearly everybody eats them, and they have become a regular and much-sought-for article of food. Frogs produced in Canada meet with popular favor in the United States. The preference for Canadian frogs is said to be owing to the way the legs are prepared for market by Canadian producers, who, it is said, understand this detail better than those who are engaged in the business in the United States. The Live Stock Journal says that frog farming is sure to become one of the most profitable of all our small industries, and already quite a large number are engaged in raising frogs for market. There is said to be a profitable frog farm within ten miles of New York city, the owner of which is able to live south during the winter on the profits of the industry. The frog expert of the Smithsonian Institute is quoted as saying that there are forty species of frogs known to the scientific world. Of these the largest is the gigantic "bellower," found in the swamps of Louisiana. This frog grows to four pounds weight, and is one of the choicest for table use. Next to the "bellower" come the Potomac and New York frogs, both large and of superior flavor. It is, however, true that there is scarcely a state in the Union in which good table frogs cannot be found in abundance. At present, however, Canada has the call for frog legs in the American market. The industry is capable of considerable development, especially in localities that are contiguous to the large cities.
