With care he is brought around and his wife is reconciled to forgiving him, but he slips into the old way of living, and in company with a former city associate he loses his life by falling over a cliff, thus leaving the two lovers free to marry.

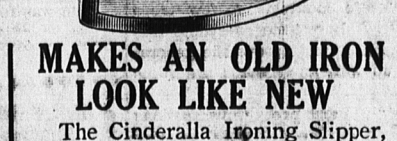
