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MOUNTAIN PEAK YET UNSCALED BY MAN

Third Attempt to Reach Everest Summit Ends in Disaster—Monsoon Causes Tragedy.

LONDON, June 22.—Sir Francis Younghusband, president of the Royal Geographical Society, tonight informed the newspapers that a telegram had been received by the Mount Everest expedition committee in London to the effect that the attempt to scale Mount Everest had ended in disaster, involving the death of two members, George Leith Mallory and A. C. Irvine.

Interviewed at Westminster, Sir Francis said he was not known how the disaster occurred, but that it probably happened a fortnight ago.

The expedition, according to Sir Francis, was within a short distance of the summit at a greater height than ever had been reached before. It had experienced great difficulty in fighting its way through tremendous blizzards, which lasted for weeks. The members of the expedition must have been greatly exhausted when Mallory and Irvine died. It was the final assault on the peak, and the men had great hopes of reaching the top.

Sir Francis said it was almost certain that the expedition would be abandoned for this year.

Monsoon Blamed

News of the disaster reached Mallory's home in Birkenhead tonight. According to the Daily Express, the climber was caught by a monsoon near the summit after a wonderful climb under the worst weather conditions they had experienced.

The present is the third expedition which has failed to reach the summit of Mount Everest, the highest peak in the world, 29,002 feet above the sea level.

Everest is in the Himalayas, on the border of Nepal and Tibet.

On March 27 last a party of 12 men started out from Darjeeling, British India, for the conquest of the peak. Of the party

ANNUAL CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION YESTERDAY

Impressive Ceremony At Notre Dame Academy Where Pontifical Benediction Was Held.

After High Mass yesterday morning the congregation of St. Dunstan's Cathedral held its annual Corpus Christi procession from the Cathedral to Notre Dame Academy where his Lordship Bishop O'Leary officiated at Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, the kneeling congregation almost covering the whole of Hillsboro Square.

At Pontifical High Mass at the Cathedral his Lordship Bishop O'Leary officiated, the assisting priests being Rev. A. J. McIntyre, The Deacons and Sub-Deacons were Rev. Andre Arsenault, and Rev. P. Walsh. The Deacons of Honor were Rev. F. McQuaid and Rev. Jas. Murphy. The Master of Ceremonies was Rev. Jas. Rooney, assistant. Mr. Louis Bourque, Rev. M. McDonald, Rev. (Dr.) J. C. McMillan, Rev. Jas. Gallant, Rev. B. Gillis, Rev. Theodore Gallant.

An able sermon was preached by Rev. Alphonsus Simout, of Summerside.

The streets traversed by the procession, which extended along several city blocks were lined with thousands of interested and impressed spectators.

The line of march was along Great George, Richmond and Westmouth streets to Notre Dame Academy, in the northern balcony of which a large cross and an altar had been erected. Sacred music was sung by the Cathedral Choir and the League of the Cross band, both to the sublimity of the service.

JOHN'S, Nfld., June 22.—Three men, who set out from the Canadian Pacific liner Metagama in search of a landing place after she had collided in the fog yesterday with the Italian steamer Clara Camis off Cape Race had not been found tonight, according to reports from the Cape Race wireless station. The United States coastguard cutters Tampa and Modoc, in northern waters on the ice patrol duty which have been co-operating in the search for the drifting ship's boat, reported that they had been unable to find them.

Out. Stumbling Block To Redistribution Bill

OTTAWA, June 22.—Ontario is still the chief stumbling block to the completion of the redistribution bill. Quebec is now said to have been agreed upon, including the Island of Montreal which is to have thirteen members.

The western provinces are pretty well settled, and no serious difficulty is anticipated in the Maritime Provinces. In Ontario the schedules are said to be in an "embryonic" state. It is still expected to bring in the bill at the present session, but it is possible that differences in Ontario may make that impossible.

HAMILTON HAS \$225,000 FIRE LOSS

INDIANS FACE DEATH FROM LEPROSY

Once Powerful Tribe Now Almost Extirminated by Disease.

EDMONTON, June 22.—The Sicani Indians who live in the valley of the Pinay River are a veritable band of lepers and are facing extermination according to Henry Steg, fur trader who has arrived at Edmonton from the far north of British Columbia.

The disease has so ravaged these people once full of health and vitality, that today less than two hundred remain in the district, and most of these are either blind or horribly maimed. Some are suffering tortures of slow death, unable to do anything to check the advancing grip of the disease. Others blind or nearly so, scrape their way about the mountains hunting moose, their pinched faces and emaciated bodies the animals and so add hunger to their other sufferings.

British Captain Held On Bail of \$25,000

MONTREAL, June 22.—Alleged to be in league with Rum Runners carrying on outside the twelve-mile limit of New York Harbour, Samuel Charles Ford, of New York, skipper of the "Latzen," a British steamer, was brought before Judge Casan this morning charged with conspiracy. He pleaded guilty and was remanded for preliminary investigation until June 26. Bail set at \$25,000. The prisoner is accused of conspiracy in failing to deliver a cargo of liquor valued at \$80,000 to a designated destination.

Consul General For Spain Now in Jail

MONTREAL, June 22.—Miguel Malaguez, Consul General for Spain at Montreal, Raymond Tey de Torrens and Albert Vincent, manager of the Hill Bonded Warehouses, today were committed by Judge Casan for trial before the Court of King's Bench on the charge of conspiring to import alcohol into Canada. An additional charge of conspiring to import cocaine and morphine also was laid. The trio pleaded not guilty. The Consul and Torrens, still unable to furnish bail, were returned to Bordeaux Jail.

GOVERNMENT HAS NO NEW PROPOSALS FOR P. O. STRIKERS

OTTAWA, Ont., June 22.—Premier King announced this morning the government had no new proposals to make to postal men on strike.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 22.—Postmasters at Toronto, Montreal, Kitchener and Windsor were instructed in telegram from the acting Postmaster General today to proceed to recruit men to replace those who did not report for duty this morning.

The telegram said that men who did not report this morning were definitely out of the service, and asked that preference be given in making appointments to those who had passed the civil service examination and to returned soldiers.

GOVERNOR GEN. OF FREE STATE MAY RESIGN

LONDON, June 22.—The resignation of Tim Healy, Governor General of the Irish Free State is expected to be announced shortly. His successor will probably be Senator Fogarty of Dublin, the surgeon poet of Ireland who was kidnapped during civil troubles and escaped from confinement by swimming the Liffey.

Governor General Healy's recent controversial political speeches on the Boundary Question are criticized although it is not generally admitted that he has overstepped his prerogative.

It is also stated that Premier Cosgrave is seeking some immediate aid to stem the tide of opposition to the constitutional government, which may sweep him out of office unless definite progress is made to settle the boundary question. The government is certainly losing the confidence of the people, especially since the publication of the report of the committee of investigation into military affairs and the army and which white washed Mulcahy and other leaders despite the revelations made of lack of discipline and political activity due to propaganda of the Irish Republican Brotherhood permeating the ranks of the army.

The week is to open according to an announcement with a debate on an amendment to the British North America Act, which involves the question of Canada's status in the Empire.

RESULTS OF THE BRITISH COLUMBIA ELECTIONS

With Four Polls To Hear From Liberals Have Elected 20 Members But May Not Have a Clear Working Majority

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 22.—The Liberals of British Columbia in yesterday's general election elected twenty members to the legislature, the largest number of any of the parties but whether the government of Hon. John Oliver will have a clear working majority in the assembly will depend on final results in four ridings which this morning were in doubt.

While the Liberal party triumphed Premier Oliver's veteran leader went down to defeat with his three party mates in Victoria, the Conservatives in the capital elected a full ticket of four. In Vancouver the Conservatives failed to elect a single candidate out of six seats.

All cabinet ministers except Premier Oliver have been returned. No women have been elected. One hundred and sixty seven candidates offered for election.

VANCOUVER, June 22.—Cities and most of the labor towns in British Columbia declared yesterday against the sale of beer by the glass under government control.

Returns of the plebiscite in nearly all rural constituencies were far from complete early today and the attitude of the electors in county districts on the question will not be known for some hours yet. Some places were very emphatic against the sale of liquor. In Vancouver the majority against was 247.

STARTLING DISCLOSURES ARE EXPECTED

LONDON, June 22.—Extraordinary disclosures are expected to be made in the House of Commons next Thursday when the debate on the estimates of the Ministry of Labor are continued.

The Conservatives are continuing their attack on the unemployment policy or lack of policy of the Government, taking the attitude that a serious situation is arising in industrial Britain as a result of the many unofficial strikes, and notably the recent strike of the employees of London's great underground system which was unauthorized, and was looked upon with disfavor by the Unions.

They are demanding that the full information available be given to the House with regard to the activities of the Communists in Great Britain with what knowledge is in the hands of the Government, the sources of the funds to finance these outlaw strikes.

The Government has stated that it is prepared to furnish all the information it has regarding the efforts of the Communists to foment industrial trouble and to destroy trades unionism and some startling disclosures are expected.
