Potatoes were selling at 23 to 25 cents per bushel yesterday, turnips at 11 cents; black oats 52 cents, white 50 cents; hay \$18 and straw \$6.

A. L. Harrington of the Halifax Wanderers will probably referee the football match between St. Dunstons and Abegweits tomorrow afternoon.

The S. S. A. W. Perry, from Boston arrived in this Port yesterday morning at seven o'clock. She brought a large general cargo, but only three passengers.

A very thick fog prevailed over the harbor last evening, and steamers and tugs sailing in and out made plenty of noise making their whereabouts known to each other.

The result of the Halifax Herald Road Race in which McNevin and Reddin of this city entered will be announced at the football match on the C. A. A. grounds tomorrow afternoon.

The Schooner Elva M. made the run from Crapaud to Halifax in 44 hours. She was loaded with produce by Wright Bros. Victoria. The distance is about 300 miles, an average of nearly seven miles an hour.

The S. S. City of London returned from Vernon River, Bush, China Point and Halifax's last evening with 175 bushels potatoes, 25 barrels produce, 10 tubs butter, 15 cases eggs, 15 dressed hogs, and 3 beef cattle.

Among the outgoing passengers by the A. W. Perry, which sailed from this port yesterday afternoon for Boston were: Mrs. M. B. McKenna, L. C. Hall, Mrs. D. A. Walker and J. V. McNell. There was a big cargo chiefly potatoes, mackerel and other products of the Province.

There was a well attended market yesterday morning, but the rain which began during the afternoon had the effect of driving most of the people home. There was a generous display of meat, poultry and the products of the farm and garden. Prices will be found in the market column.

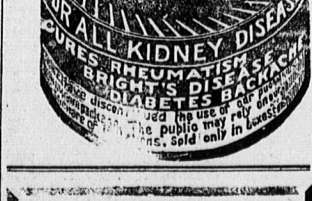
