Match Between One-Time Champion and Harry Willis Under Consideration NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—A match between Jack Johnson, one time heavyweight champion of the world and Harry Willis, now the leading negro heavyweight is under consideration for this city. When the bout will take place depends on Johnson's stock in escaping from prison.
