Mrs. Jane Crosby Passes Away At St. Eleanors

There passed away at the home of her son, Mr. Percy Crosby, St. Eleanors, in the early hours of Tuesday, April 19th, Mrs. Jane D. Crosby, widow of Albert Crosby, after a week of suffering following a regrettable accident on April 11th, when she fell and fractured her hip. Mrs. Crosby, who was in her 80th year, previous to her accident had been remarkably active for her years. She is survived by her two sons, Percy at St. Eleanors, and Louis, of Banff, Alberta, who arrived home by plane from Calgary about 6:30 last evening.

The late Mrs. Crosby was a native of Charlottetown, the last surviving member of the former well-known Stumbles family. Her father, William Washington Stumbles, in his day, was a prominent merchant of the capital, who conducted a store on Great George Street. Her mother was Mary Brennan, daughter of John Brennan, who had the distinction of being the first clockmaker to come to this province. He came from Plymouth in Devonshire, and settled in Charlottetown, where he conducted business. The funeral service will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Bowness Funeral Home.—S

CRONIN'S "HATTER'S CASTLE" DARING FILM TALE OF TERROR
