Notes By The Way (Continued from Page 4) From the birthday of the Dominion the one permanent question always at issue between contending parties has been the trade question. Trade and tariff policies have always been and still are bones of contention and strife. This line of demarcation between parties has always been more clear than any other. It now a realignment of parties can be effected on this basis—getting rid of the group system and back to the two-party plan—the change would tend to clear the political atmosphere and to simplify many complex problems of government and legislation. It might prove to be an acceptable and welcome change.
