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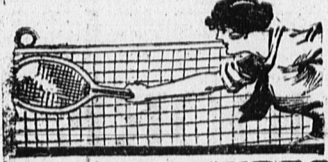

SEE TRAIN SOON LONDON TO PARIS.

LONDON.—Departure of a train from London to Paris every five or ten minutes, travel between the two capitals, was the possibility held out by Sir Francis Fox in an address recently delivered before the Royal Geographical Society.

Looking into the future, he declared that the tunnel could be used to traverse France, Belgium, Holland, Spain, Italy, Germany, Austria, Hungary and Turkey, as far as Constantinople.

The tunnel would consist of two tubes, eighteen feet in diameter. In the Channel above the sea bed the maximum depth of water would be from 160 feet to 180 feet.

Islander in England Hears of Brother's Death

The following letter has been received by Mr. A. Beaton, Brookfield, from his son now in England after he had received the sad news of his brother's death:

Bramshot Haits, May 11th, 1917.

Dear Father—Just a few lines to let you know that I am well hoping this will find you all the same. I had a card from France stating that Charlie was wounded again so I wrote to the Red Cross Society, London to find out what Hospital he was in.

After waiting for about a week I received a letter from them stating that poor Charlie died of wounds on the 28th April. It is with pain I write and tell you this but I suppose you have been notified by the War Office by now. The last time I saw Charlie was in Hastings, when he was over here on leave. There are very few in the Canadian Army who saw more service in France than Charlie.
