month tangled communications and blocked highways in some sections of the latter two Provinces. Along the coast gales took their seasonal toll of shipping.

Storms in quick succession made Montreal officials term the winter "pretty tough" and "definitely a bad winter." Snowfall to date has been 129 inches, 20 inches less than in 1942-43.

But in Ottawa, 120 miles to the northwest, Weatherman F. W. Baker said the season in the Ottawa area had not been so bad. A 26 3/4-inch snowfall the week-end of Feb. 23 was the heaviest on record but for average temperature the winter did not even come close to the marriage-frezing one of 1933-34.

Records show the season in Ontario was "average." In parts of the Bruce Peninsula and Muskoka districts southwest of Georgian Bay the snowfall was twice the normal amount. Experts blame the severe drifting which blocked Southern Ontario roads for days at a time on the type of snow—light, dry and just right to make snowbanks.

Some of the hardest words of all concerning the winter came from traditionally-balmy British Columbia. Said a Vancouver weatherman: "It was the meanest in years, topping the cold wave of 1935 which

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moving the adjournment of the debate. He said he appreciated the "tone" of the Opposition leader's speech. "Someone," he added, "said it was a more Liberal speech than that delivered by the second-er of the Address (Mr. Cullen). He thought the only contentious part was a reference to the Summerside power plant being expropriated."

Dr. MacMillan: "I said they had taken power to expropriate."

Premier Jones said he would like to end the debate so that the very important resolutions moved by the Provincial Treasurer might get some kind of precedence. They had reference to the new tax agreement negotiated with the Dominion Government.

"I don't think the matter can be delayed," the Premier said. "The Government of Canada will want to know what is our desire with regard to these bills."

Dr. MacMillan: "Have you got to get them through at a certain time?"

Hon. Mr. Barbour: "Before the end of the month."

Premier Jones: "We might even have to postpone the Draft Address in order to give them precedence."

Hon. Mr. Barbour: "I think we are expecting an interim payment from the first of January to the 31st of March."

It was at this point that Premier Jones moved the adjournment.
