(From our Own Correspondent.) OTTAWA, March 31.—Arrangements have been completed for the organization of classes for disabled soldiers in Ross Convalescent Home at Sydney, N.S., and preparations are in an advanced state for the establishment of similar classes in the Montreal and Quebec.

VIOLENT GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED BY FRENCH

After Occupying Village of Malancourt which is in Ruins the Germans Made a Violent Attack on the French Line and Succeeded in Entering First Line of Trenches but were Immediately Driven Out while other Attacks were Put Down Completely.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, March 31.—Having captured the village of Malancourt, the Germans have shifted their offensive westward to the sector around the famous Le Mort Homme. With heavy forces the Teutons have attacked the French line between Hill 295 and Le Mort Homme, and succeeded in entering the French first line of trenches.

GERMANS PLANNED A RAID ON CANADA

Military Expedition to Invade Canada was Stopped by Failure to Procure Firing Squad at Appointed Time. Matter now being Investigated by United States.

NEW YORK, March 31.—A military expedition to invade Canada, which was halted by the failure of a Buffalo (N.Y.) lawyer to produce at a time agreed upon, an organized "firing squad," it was asserted to-night, was part of an alleged conspiracy to violate the neutrality of the United States.
