THE CAR FERRY.—The steamer Prince Edward left docked in the harbor yesterday at noon with one hundred and eighteen tons freight, two and one half tons express, eighty sacks mail and ninety passengers.

FUNERAL FRIDAY.—The funeral of the late Rev. A. B. McLeod, will take place from his late residence, Kent St., at St. James Church, Friday. After a short service at the house beginning at 2 o'clock, the body will be taken to St. James Church where the funeral service will be held, beginning at 2:30. Interment will be at Peoples Cemetery.

LAW EXAMINATIONS.—The intermediate law examinations are taking place this week and are being conducted by Messrs. Smallwood and Martin K. C's. The students taking the examinations are J. A. REPORTS MISSING.—Word was received in this City yesterday by Mr. Bert Davison of the Post Office that his brother Ben, a young man of nineteen years, who left Esplanade with the 49th Battalion, is missing. Private Davison, whose mother is Mrs. James R. Davison, Trail B.C., has been at the front since September. Many home friends will sympathize with Mrs. Davison and family in the sad news they have received.

THE POLICE COURT.—Yesterday at the Police Court a prohibition case against Allan McDonald was adjourned until the 20th. An assault and battery case Maud McDonald vs. Beale Gormley, in which there was much contradictory evidence, and in which hair-pulling and an axe and a revolver and broken windows were big factors resulted in a conviction against the accused, a fine of \$10 and costs or 20 days imprisonment.

SAD NEWS.—Mrs. Clifford Williams, Summerside, received word of the death of her father Capt. Jas. C. McQuarrie, which took place at Whitthrop Mass on Tuesday last. Deceased was about 65 years of age, a native of Pictou N. S., and had been ailing for some years. The remains are expected to arrive in Pictou on Friday and the funeral will be held on Saturday. Mrs. Williams leaves to-day to attend the funeral.

WEDDING BELLS.—Yesterday morning at the residence of the bride's parents Mr. and Mrs. Neil Stewart, Kensington, their daughter, Miss Mary Ruth, became the bride of Mr. Robert Kelly Clements, Middleton, Annapolis Valley, N. S. The bride was for several years a valued operator in the Kensington Telephone Exchange. Mr. Clements, Electrical Engineer, has been engaged in installing the electric light system in the Town of Kensington. The bride party left on an extended trip through the Maritime Provinces. The officiating clergyman was the Rev. Mr. Johnson.

BOARD OF TRADE.—Quarterly meeting of Summerside Board of Trade was held in Council Chamber on Tuesday evening. Pres. Morrice presided with a number of members present. After routine business a resolution, conveying to the Town Council, a vote of thanks for the courteous manner in which they received the committee from the Board and their action in granting the use of the Court Room in which to hold Board of Trade meetings moved by W. J. Lidstone, seconded C. McArthur. The secretary read considerable correspondence and telegrams re Railway and Steam service on which there was considerable discussion. The matter of summer service was also taken up and discussed at some length, as the ports of Summerside and Pt. du Chene are now both clear of ice, the telegram was ordered sent to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, asking when the Northumberland may be expected to take up this service.

WORTH WHILE SEEING.—The Guardian Sportsman, the oldest turf and live stock journal in America, has a highly interesting article on the racing career of Mayor Brown. The article, which is from the pen of Mr. Hugh McInnis, takes up Mayor Brown's turf history from the time he left his home in Uxbridge, Ont., thirty-eight years ago until he succeeded to the mayor's chair. Thirty-eight years is a long space in the life of an individual and many happenings are usually crowded into it. In that time, Mr. Brown has seen the leading figure in the turf history of these provinces, and some of his experiences are of a character most interesting to followers of the racing game. The story of his famous bluecoat race in Turf, the Hermitage, race in Summerside and the picture horse race are especially noteworthy. The Sportsman is making a strong bid for the patronage of horsemen in these provinces by the sea and has engaged Mr. McInnis to represent it in this territory in a news and business way.

VISITORS DAY.—West Kent which was held at West Kent School, yesterday was a decided success. The pupils acquitted themselves most creditably. The order was excellent and the enthusiasm and interest manifested by the pupils in their work was plainly evident to all. Much praise is due Prof. Hinton for the excellent manner in which the pupils sang their choruses and solos. Most commendatory remarks were made by Mr. Henry Smith, Chairman of the School Board, who presided during the rendering of the program in the assembly hall. Colonel Campbell also spoke of the warm and indissoluble attachment he had towards West Kent School and highly complimented the boys on the efficiency of their physical drill, while strongly emphasizing the absolute necessity of physical as well as mental training. SUCCESSFUL CO-OPERATION.—The Dunstaffnage Creamery are making more butter than they have ever made during the winter season since the creamery started; their patrons extend over a large area. The three sendings in the largest amounts of butter fat by rail during the month of March were as follows: Geo. W. Hooper, Milton, 220.5 lbs.; MacLeod Bros. North Wiltshire 178.5 lbs. and J. L. Hawkins, Murray Harbor 139 lbs. The three local patrons furnishing the largest amount were Andrew MacRae, East Royalty 366.3 lbs.; C. T. Ferguson, Marshfield 359.3 lbs. and Chas. Robertson, Marshfield, 284.5 lbs. At a special meeting of the directors on Monday last, a proposition from the railway, in reference to the putting in of a siding for the handling of cream coming in by rail, was accepted and the cream will be unloaded from the train this season within a few yards of the creamery. Arrangements were completed for enlarging the building

and plant had to have everything in first class shape for the increased business that is already in sight for this season. Large orders are already coming in for cans from farmers who purpose shipping by rail. The directors also decided to adopt cream grading at an early date and to advise all patrons by letter in regard to the details of carrying out this system of receiving cream. Extracts from a letter sent by Sergeant B. F. MacDonald 25th Battalion, to his wife in this city. Sergeant MacDonald has seen several years' service with the American army and has been recommended for a commission for work on the firing line. Somewhere in France.

March 11th, 1916.

I am writing this from the firing line. We have had it very hard this last three weeks, but have the Germans on the go—and I think we will keep them that way. I have just come out of the heaviest firing I ever saw—24 hours of it—and am going back tonight again. We got about 600 prisoners, but they do not look as well as we do. The fighting is going on very hard, but God is good to me, and I tell you it is out here that we know there is a God. During the last fighting, someone's prayers were answered for me and also for some of the others. What do you think of a close call like this? I have one bullet-hole through my rifle stock, and nine-holes
